P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Eleventh Day of this Instant March, to promise and declare, (amongst other Things) that the Bounties of three Pounds for every Able Seaman, of Forty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, and of Twenty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, should be paid to every such Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of this Instant, voluntarily Enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds should be also paid to any Person who should, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman, or Seamen, who should conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time thereby limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the Time limited by the said Proclamation for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant March, to the Thirtieth Day of April next, inclusive—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Paris, April 9. The Parliament of Paris having, by their Resolution of the 18th of last Month, on an Appeal of the Attorney General against the Proceedings of the Chapter of Orleans, relative to the present Differences on the Refusal of Sacraments, declared that there was Abuse in the Execution of the Bull *Unigenitus*; his most Christian Majesty has thought proper, by an Arrêt of the Council of State of the 4th Instant (wherein it is said that that Bull is a Law both of the Church and State) to annul that Resolution of the Parliament, as far as relates to that Point, and in as much as the Parliament, under Pretence of enforcing the Execution of his Majesty's Declaration of the 2d of September last, has, contrary to his Majesty's Views and Intentions, extended, and interpreted the Dispositions thereof. The Parliament met again Yesterday for the first Time after their Adjournment for the Easter Holidays. M. Machault, the Garde des Sceaux, and Minister of the Marine, is very ill of a Fistula.
