P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Eleventh Day of this Instant March, to promise and declare, (amongst other Things) that the Bounties of three Pounds for every Able Seaman, of Forty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, and of Twenty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, should be paid to every such Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of this Instant, voluntarily Enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds should be also paid to any Person who should, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman, or Seamen, who should conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time thereby limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the Time limited by the said Proclamation for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant March, to the Thirtieth Day of April next, inclusive—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Leghorn, March 30. Yesterday M. Staudard, their Imperial Majesties late Consul at Algiers, arrived here from Port Mahon in an English Ship, on board of which he embarked at Algiers on the 4th Instant, soon after that Regency had taken the Resolution to declare War against Tuscany. We are informed by the Master of a Ship that arrived here a few

Days ago from Ajaccio, that every Thing is in perfect Tranquility in Corfica, owing to the prudent Management of the Marquis Doria, the Republick of Genoa's Commissary General in that Island.

Madrid, March 31. Their Catholick Majesties continue in perfect Health at their Palace of Buen-Retiro. They attended last Week at the usual Devotions of the Season, and last Night the Court-Diversions were again opened, with the Performance of the Opera of Dido. This Day being the Queen of Portugal's Birth-Day, their Majesties received the Compliments usual on the Occasion, and the Marquis de Tripucci, Mayor-domo-Mayor to the Queen-Dowager, and the Marquis de la Mina, Governor of Catalonia, had the Honour to be covered for the first Time, as Grandees of Spain. Count Azlor his Catholick Majesty's late Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Vienna, arrived here some Days ago, and will soon set out for Cadiz, to take Possession of that Government.

Copenhagen, April 4. On Wednesday last, being the King's Birth-Day, the same was celebrated at Court with great Magnificence. On this Occasion their Majesties dined in Publick, the Foreign Ministers and principal Nobility of both Sexes being seated at three other Tables; and at Night there was a Supper, consisting of 70 Dishes, and afterwards a Ball, which was opened by the Queen and the Prince Royal, and lasted till Break of Day. The Household of the Prince Royal is compleatly formed, and M. Berckentin is appointed Grand Master thereof. On the 28th past, the Ice upon the Sound began to break, and the Wind having continued ever since at South West, the Passage thereof is now become free, but the Great Belt is still covered with Ice. The Time is not yet fixed for their Majesties Departure for Frederichsbourg, where they propose to spend Part of the Summer, but 'tis thought it will shortly take Place.

Ulm, April 7. As there were some Papers of Consequence in the Mail that was sent from Schaffhausen to Swisserland on the 27th past, which was lost in passing a River near this City, by the Courier's missing the Bridge that was then covered with Water, the greatest Pains imaginable

ble have been taken to recover it, but all their Labour has hitherto proved unsuccessful; and 'tis feared the Rapidity of the Stream at that Time carried it into the Danube, into which the River empties itself not far from the said Bridge

Dresden, April 8. On Tuesday last the King, accompanied by the Princes Xavier and Charles, and several of the principal Lords of the Court, went a hunting of Moor Game for the first Time this Season, and lay that Night at Okrille. The three following Days his Majesty followed the same Diversion, which is to continue all this Month if the Weather proves favourable.

Frankfort, April 9. The Elector of Cologne, who arrived here on Monday last, was saluted at his Entrance into this City by a triple Discharge of the Cannon upon our Ramparts. His Serene Highness left Mergentheim last Saturday Morning, and arrived the same Day at Wertheim, where he embarked on board his Yatch, in order to go by Water to Bonn, but the Wind coming contrary, obliged him to land near Aschaffembourg, from whence he came hither, and this Morning he continued his Journey to Bonn by Land.

Bremen, April 9. On Sunday last, about three in the Afternoon, we had a most violent Storm of Rain and Thunder, the Lightning fell on the Tower of the Church of St. Agarie, which was soon after in Flames, but proper Assistance coming, it was soon extinguished, and the Damage the Church received was not very considerable. Two Persons had the Misfortune to lose their Lives on this Occasion by the falling down of some large Stones.

Altena, April 10. We hear from Holstein, that M. Thomstorff, Colonel of the Regiment of Horse of Jutland, died a few Days ago at Itzehoe, in the 61st Year of his Age.

General Post-Office, April 22, 1755.

Whereas the Post-Boy, carrying the Derby Mail, that was dispatched from this Office on Saturday the 19th Instant, was attack'd between Market Harborough and Kibworth, on Sunday Night the 20th Instant, about Eleven o'Clock, by two Men on Foot, who seized on his Horse's Bridle, and led him to an Hedge about one hundred Yards distant from the Road, where they took off, and rifled the Mail, and took out and carried off the following Bags, viz.

Leicester, | Nottingham,
Loughborough, | Derby and Ashbourn.

The Boy saith, one of the Robbers was a middle-sized thin Man, and the other a fat jolly tall Man: The middle-sized Man had on a light colour'd Coat, and wore his own Hair, which was black, and Part of it platted and pulled over his Face, and his Hat slouched before, and was seemingly a genteel Man. The fat jolly tall Man had on a grey Wig and Snuff colour'd Coat, and his Hat slouched before. After the Robbery they immediately mounted their Horses, which were tied to the abovementioned Hedge, and rode with full Speed towards Harborough. The Boy adds, that one of the Horses

was of a grey Colour, and the other a darkish Colour.
