# Westminster, April 25.

IS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes feated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Honourable Sir Henry Bellenden, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Meffage from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Allent to

An Act to continue several Laws relating to the Distemper now raging among the Horned Cattle in this Kingdom.

An Act to explain and amend a Clause in an Act made in the Fifth Year of the Reign of Queen Anne, intitled, An AEt for the better Prefervation of the Game, in relation to the Selling, or offering to Sale, any Game.

An Act to indemnify Persons who have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Promotions within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further Time for that Purpose.

An Act for granting to His Majesty the Sum of One Million, to be raised by a Lottery.

An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money therein mentioned, out of the Sinking Fund; and applying certain Monies, remaining in the Exchequer, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and fifty five; and for carrying the Surplus of certain Duties to the Sinking Fund; and for the further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Seffion of Parliament.

An Act for further explaining, amending, and rendering more effectual, An Act made in the Twenty third Year of the Reign of His prefent Majesty, intitled, An Act for the Encouragement of the British White Herring Fishery, and for giving further Encouragement for the carrying on the Jaid Fishery, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for continuing, explaining, and amending the Jeveral Alls of Parliament made for the further Encouragement of the Whale Fishery, carried on by His Majesty's Subjects, and to authorize the Payment of the Bounty to Thomas Hood and others, upon three Ships fitted out for the faid Fishery, and lost in the Greenland Seas.

An Act for continuing an Act intitled an Act for encouraging the Making of Indico in the Britifh Plantations in America. An Act for the better Supply of Mariners and Seamen to ferve in His Majesty's Ships of War, and on Board Merchant Ships, and other Trading Ships and Veffels. An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Marine Forces, while on Shore. An Act for making perpetual an Act passed in the Twenty fifth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majesty, for the better preventing Thests and Robberies, and for regulating Places of publick Entertainment, and punishing Persons keeping diforderly Houses; for the further punishing Perfons selling Ale, or other Liquors, without Licence; for the preventing the burning, or destroying, of Goss, Furze, or Furn, in Forests or Chaces; for giving further Time for the Payment of Duties omitted to be paid for the Indentures or Contracts of Clerks and Apprentices; and for the Filing of Affidavits of the Execution of Contracts of Clerks to Attornies and Sollicitors.

An Act for Relief of Infolvent Debtors.

An Act for making more effectual the Laws prohibiting the Importation of Spirituous Liquors in Casks or Vessels not containing Sixty Gallons, and of Tea abrve the Quantity of Six Pounds, found on Board any British Ship or Vessel, not belonging to, or employed by, the East-India Company.

An Act to amend an Act made in the Twenty fixth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majesty, intituled, An Act for the Amendment and Prefervation of the Publick Highways and Turnpike Roads of this Kingdom, and for the more effectual Execution of the Laws relating thereto.

An Act to enable the Reverend William Markham, Doctor of Laws, and Thomas Salter, Esquire, to build Houses and open a Square in and upon a certain Piece of Ground called Deans-Yard, Westminster, and several Pieces of Ground contiguous thereto.

An Act to enable the Churchwardens, Overfeers and Inhabitants, of the Parish of St. Saviour in the Borough of Southwark in the County of Surry, to bold a Market within the faid Parish, not interfering with the High-Street in the faid Borough.

An AEI for building a Bridge over the Water. or Haven, between the Town of Sandwich and the opposite Shore, in the County of Kent. An Act to enable the Parishioners of the Parish of the Holy Trinity in Guldeford, in the County of Surry, to fell divers Houses, Lands, Rents, and Annuities in the faid Parish, and in Stoke next Guldeford aforesaid, and to apply the Money ari-Jing by Sale thereof, towards rebuilding their Parish Church, and for other Purposes therein mentioned. An Act for repairing, widening, and amending the Road from Cocking End near Addingham, in the West Riding of the County of York, through Kildwick, to Black Lane End in the County Palatine of Lancaster. An Act for repairing and widening the Road A from Rochdale to Burnley in the County of Lancaster. An Act for amending, altering, continuing, and making more effectual, two Acts of Parliament made in the Second and Seventeenth Years of His prefent Majefty's Reign, for repairing the Roads from Colefhill in the County of Warwick, through the City of Litchfield, to Stone in the County of Stafford, and from themce to the City of Chefters and several other Roads in the faid Acts mentioned, and for enlarging the Term and Powers in the said several Acts.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from the Town of Manchefter, by a Place called the White Smithy, in the Township of Crumpsal, to the Town of Rochdale, and from the said Place called the White Smithy, by a Place called Besses of the Barn, to the Town of Bury, and from the said Place called Besses of the Barn, to Radcliffe Bridge in the County Palatine of Lancaster.

F have nothing to defire of you, but fleadily to purfue those good Principles, which you have so folemnly professed to me, and; with so much Honour to yourselves, adhered to. Let it be your Endeavour to maintain Tranquillity and good Order in your several Countries, and to cultivate in my good Subjects just Notions of my Government and Measures, which are, and shall always be, directed to their Happiness and Prosperity.

My Lords, and Gentlemen, T is His Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, That this Parliament be prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty Seventh Day of May next, to be then here held; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty Seventh Day of May next.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

## My Lords, and Gentlemen,

THE many eminent Proofs which you have given of your Duty and Affection to my Perfon and Government, during the Courfe of this Seffion of Parliament, have afforded me the greatest Satisfaction; and the Zeal you have shewn for supporting the Honour, Rights, and Posseffions of my Crown, has been no less agreeable to me.

My Defire to preserve the Publick Tranquillity has been fincere and uniform. I have religiously adhered to the Stipulations of the Treaty of Aix la Chapelle; and made it my Care, not to injure, or give just Cause of Offence to, any Power whatfoever. But I never could entertain a Thought of purchasing the Name of Peage, at the Expence of fuffering Encroachments upon, or of yielding up, what is justly belonging to Great Britain, either by ancient Possession, or by solemn Treaties, Your Vigour and Firmness, on this important Occasion, have enabled me to be prepared for fuch Contingencies as may happen. If reasonable and honourable Terms of Accommodation can be agreed upon, I shall be satisfied. In all Events, I shall rely on the Justice of our Caule, the effectual Support of my People, and the Protection of the Divine Providence.

# PRESENT,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Eleventh Day of this Instant March, to promile and declare, (amongst other Things) that the Bounties of three Pounds for every Able Sea.\* man, of Forty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, and of Twenty Shillings for every Ablebodied Landman, should be paid to every such Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of this Instant, voluntarily Enter themselves to serve in His Majefty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds should be also paid to any Person who should, on or before the faid Thirty-first Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman, or Seamen, who should conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majefty's faid Service—And whereas the Time thereby limited for paying the faid Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the fame should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty, with the Advice of His : Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the Time limited by the faid Proclamation for Payment of s the faid Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the faid Thirty-first Day of this Instant March, to the Thirtieth Day of April. next, inclusive – Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice and govern themfelves accordingly. Gentlemen of the House of Commons, I return you my Thanks for the neceflary Provisions you have made for the Service of the current Year. The extraordinary Supply which you have granted me, towards augmenting my Forces by Sea and Land, is such a Proof of your Confidence in me, and of your constant Attention to the Service of your Country, that I cannot sufficiently express the Satisfaction I take, in this feasonable Care of the Safety of my Kingdoms and Dominions; or in the Evidence it has produced, of the Extent of our Publick Credit, and of the Zeal of my Subjects, In this Conjuncture.

General Post-Office, April 22, 1755. Whereas the Post-Boy, carrying the Derby Mail, that was dispatched from this Office on Saturday the 19th Instant, was attack'd between Market Harborough and Kibworth, on Sunday Night the 20th Instant, about Eleven o'Clock, by two Men on Foot, who seized on his Horse's Bridle, and led him to an Hedge about one bundred Yards distant from the Road, where they took off, and risled the Mail, and took out and carried off the following Bags, viz.

Leicefter, Nottingham,

Loughborough, Derby and Ashbourn.

The Boy faith, one of the Robbers was a middle-fixed thin Man, and the other a fit jolly tall Man: The middle fixed Man had on a light colour'd Coat, and wore his own Hair, which was black, and Part of it platted and pulled over his Face, and his Hat fl uched before, and was feemingly a genteel Man. The fat jolly tall Man had on a grey Wigg and Snuff colour'd Coat, and his Hat flouched before. After the Robbery they immediately mounted their Horfes, which were tied to the abovementioned Hedge, and rode with full Speed towards Harborough. The Boy adds, that one of the Horfes, was of a grey Colour, and the other a darkifh Colour. This is therefore to give Notice, that whofoever fhall
