Whereas His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Order in Council of the Twenty-seventh Day of March last, to direct, That the Bounties given by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Eleventh Day of the same Month, of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, of Forty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, and of Twenty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, should be continued to be paid to every such Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of this Instant April, voluntarily Enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds, likewise given by the said Proclamation, should be continued to be paid to any Person, who should, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman, or Seamen, who should conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time limited by His Majesty's said Order in Council, for paying the said Bounties and Rewards, is now near expiring; and His Majesty's Service requiring that the same should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby Ordered, That the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of this Instant April, to Tuesday the Twenty-seventh Day of May next inclusive. —Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

By Command of their Lordships,

Naples, March 26. The King has appointed the Marquis de Fogliani to be Viceroy of Sicily, and he is preparing to set out from hence, in order to take Possession of that important Employment. - The last Eruption of Mount Vesuvius, which continued longer than any of the former, is at length ceased, no inflammable Matter having been thrown out for some Days. Information having been received at Court, that the Inhabitants of Termini in Sicily have not only refused paying certain Taxes, but even wounded some of the Officers appointed to collect the same, his Majesty has sent Orders to the Governor of Palermo, to send thither a Detachment of 200 Men, in order to oblige those Inhabitants to a Compliance with the Laws, and to secure the Authors of the late Disturbances.

Petersbourg, March 29. The last Dispatches received from M. Obreskow, our Resident at the Ottoman Porte, assure us, that the new Sultan continues desirous to follow the Example of his Predecessor, in living at Peace with his Neighbours, and particularly with this Empire.

Genoa, April 2. We are informed by the Master of a Ship that arrived here a few Days ago from Malta, that two Men of War were sitting out there, in order to cruize on the Coast of Spain, against the Corsairs of Barbary.

Rome, April 5. The Government having received Advice, that two Barks, laden with Tobacco, had appeared off Ancona, and that a Gang of 60 Smuglers had been seen on the Coast watching for them, Orders were immediately given to prevent their landing. On the 21st of last Month, in the Night, we had a dreadful Storm of Thunder and Lightening, which greatly damaged the Church of St. Lucia.

Prague, April 8. The Moldau rose so high a few Days ago, as to overflow its Banks, occasioned by the sudden melting of the Snow upon the Mountains, and by its Rapidity, and the vast Quantity of Timber and other Things it was seen to carry with it, we apprehend it has done great Damage in the flat Country. Several large Bodies of Recruits have lately passed through this City, in order to join their respective Regiments in Moravia, and her Imperial Majesty's other Hereditary Countries.

Vienna, April 9. Two Battalions of the Regiment of Foot of Henry Daun, who arrived here a few Days ago from Bohemia, are already marched for Croatia, and the Third is forthwith to take the same Route. We have received Advice, that the Ambassador, who is coming here on the Part of the new Sultan, to notify in Form the Advancement of that Prince to the Ottoman Throne, is arrived at Raab, so that 'tis expected he will be here next Week.

Munich, April 13. On Wednesday last their Serene Highnesses, accompanied by several of the Nobility, took the Diversion of Hunting in the Forest of Furstenried, and returned at Night to the Palace of Nymphenbourg. The Cardinal Prince Bishop of Liège, Uncle to the Elector our Sovereign, intends to pass some Time at this Place, before he sets out for his Bishoprick of Freysingen, and Preparations are making at Court for his Reception.

Paris, April 18. The Deputies from the States of Burgundy had on Sunday last an Audience of the King at Versailles. They were introduced to his Majesty by the Prince of

Conde, Governor of that Province, and by the Count de St. Florentin, Minister and Secretary of State, and conducted by the Grand Master of the Ceremonies. This Deputation was composed of the Abbe de Citeaux for the Clergy, the Marquis d'Ecorailles for the Noblesse, and the Sieur Jouard for the third Estate.

Hague, April 22. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland separated on Saturday last, and are to meet again on the 7th of next Month. The Deputies of the several Collèges of the Admiralty of this Country broke up their Assembly the same Day; and, after a long Conference with the Deputies of the Assembly of the States General, set out for their respective Residences.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, on Wednesday the 12th of March last, betwixt Eight and Nine in the Evening, five Men brake into the House of Sir Hervey Elwes, Bart. at Stoke in Suffolk, and, by Threats, did oblige him to shew them where his Money was, which they carried away, to the Amount of about One Thousand Pounds, and did wound one of his Servants; they were all armed with Pistols and Cutlasses, shabbily dressed; one was a tall thin Man booted; two were short thin Men without Boots; these three had Masks on the whole Time; one of the other two was about forty Years of Age, full faced, fresh coloured, his Complexion inclined to fair, thick set, about five Feet four Inches high, had no Mask on for some Time, was without Boots; the other was thin bodied, long visaged, of a pale Complexion, believed to have a Scar on the lower Part of his Face, appeared to be about Thirty, five Feet five Inches high, booted, he had no Mask on for some Time: It is believed that a Sixth stood without, the Servant, that was attacked at the Stable, seeing a Man there, who, he thinks, was not amongst those that came into the House, and he heard one say, that he would stand at the Hall Door: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robbery, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas the Post-Boy, carrying the Derby Mail, that was dispatched from this Office on Saturday the 19th Instant, was attack'd between Market Harborough and Kibworth, on Sunday Night the 20th Instant, about Eleven o'Clock, by two Men on Foot, who seized on his Horse's Bridle, and led him to an Hedge about one hundred Yards distant from the Road, where they took off, and rifled the Mail, and took out and carried off the following Bags, viz.

Leicester, | Nottingham,
Loughborough, | Derby and Ashbourn.

The Boy saith, one of the Robbers was a middle-sized thin Man, and the other a fat jolly tall Man: The middle sized Man had on a light colour'd Coat, and wore his own Hair, which was black, and Part of it platted and pulled over his Face, and his Hat slouched before, and was seemingly a genteel Man. The fat jolly tall Man had on a grey Wigg and Snuff colour'd Coat, and his Hat slouched before. After the Robbery they immediately mounted their Horses, which were tied to the abovementioned Hedge, and rode with full Speed towards Harborough. The Boy adds, that one of the Horses was of a grey Colour, and the other a darkish Colour.

This is therefore to give Notice, that whosoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, both or either of them who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen, or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice, or knowing of this Robbery, shall make Discovery whereby either or both of the Persons, who committed the same; may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of either or both of the said Robbers, be entitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.
