The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty in Council this Day declaring His Intention of going out of the Kingdom for a short Time, was pleased to nominate the following Persons, to be Lords Justices for the Administration of the Government, during His Majesty's Absence, viz.

His Royal Highness William Duke of Cumberland,

Thomas Archbishop of Canterbury,

Philip Earl of Hardwicke, Lord Chancellor of Great Britain,

John Earl Granville, Lord President of the Council,

Charles Duke of Marlborough, Lord Privy Seal,

John Duke of Rutland, Lord Steward of His Majesty's Household,

Charles Duke of Grafton, Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household,

Archibald Duke of Argyll,

Thomas Holles Duke of Newcastle, First Commissioner of the Treasury,

Lionel Duke of Dorset, Master of the Horse,

William Lord Cavendish of Hardwyck, commonly called Marquess of Hartington, Lord Lieutenant of the Kingdom of Ireland.

Robert Earl of Holderness, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State,

William Henry Earl of Rochford, Groom of the Stole,

George Lord Anson, First Commissioner of the Admiralty,

Sir Thomas Robinson, another of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and

Henry Fox, Esq; His Majesty's Secretary at War.

Whereas His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Order in Council of the Twenty-seventh Day of March last, to direct, That the Bounties given by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Eleventh Day of the same Month, of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, of Forty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, and of Twenty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, should be continued to be paid to every such Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of this Instant April, voluntarily Enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds, likewise given by the said Proclamation, should be continued to be paid to any Person, who should, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman, or Seamen, who should conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time limited by His Majesty's said Order in Council, for paying the said Bounties and Rewards, is now near expiring; and His Majesty's Service requiring that the same should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby Ordered, That the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of this Instant April, to Tuesday the Twenty-seventh Day of May next inclusive. —Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
