The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Order in Council of the Twenty-seventh Day of March last, to direct, That the Bounties given by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Eleventh Day of the same Month, of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, of Forty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, and of Twenty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, should be continued to be paid to every such Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of this Instant April, voluntarily Enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds, likewise given by the said Proclamation, should be continued to be paid to any Person, who should, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman, or Seamen, who should conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time limited by His Majesty's said Order in Council, for paying the said Bounties and Rewards, is now near expiring; and His Majesty's Service requiring that the same should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby Ordered, That the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of this Instant April, to Tuesday the Twenty-seventh Day of May next inclusive.—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Vienna, April 12.* On Thursday last their Imperial Majesties arrived here, and assisted at a grand Council that was held at the Castle. After which they were present at the Marriage of the young Prince Aversperg with the Countess of Neuperg, the Ceremony being performed by Prince Trautson, our Archbishop: And at Night their Imperial Majesties returned to Schonbrun. The Ambassador, who is coming here to notify in Form the Advancement of Osman III. to the Ottoman Throne, is expected, towards the Middle of next Week, at Schwecchat, a Town about two Leagues from hence, where the Ministers from the Porte usually stop, in order to prepare for their publick Entry into this City. Count Kuffstein, who, under the Reign of the late Emperor Charles VI. and also at the Beginning of that of the present Emperor, had filled the Office of Vice-Chancellor of Austria, and Stadtholder of the said Province, and who at the Time of his being dismissed from those Employments, retired to his Estate, died a few Days ago. They are fitting up the Apartments of the Castle of Hetzendorff, for the Reception of the three Archdutchesses, who are to spend great Part of the Summer there.

*Madrid, April 14.* The Court is to go to Aranjuez on Wednesday the 16th Instant. The Duke de la Mina, set out from hence some Days ago for his Government of Catalonia.

*Leghorn, April 18.* The Regency have ordered two of their Ships of War, now at Porto Faraio, to be fitted out immediately, in order to protect their Navigation against the Algerines, who already infest this Coast. For these several Days past, one Ship of 26 Guns, one Zebeck of 16, and one of 10, with Algerine Colours, have been cruising in Sight of this Place, where they have already taken three Neapolitan Vessels, one Genoese, and one Felucca belonging to Corsica, so that neither the Tuscan nor Dutch Ships dare put to Sea. Every Thing seems to be quiet in Corsica.

**Berlin, April 18.** We hear from Breslau, the Capital of Silesia, that, on the 4th Instant, the Inhabitants of that City were greatly alarmed by a Fire's breaking out over-against the Gate of Schweidnitz, on Account of a Magazine of Gunpowder being in the Neighbourhood, the blowing up of which must have done great Damage, but providentially the Wind carried the Flames from it, and the Fire was extinguished with the Loss of about 12 Houses.

**Dresden, April 20.** Yesterday the King and Queen of Poland, with the Electoral Prince and Princess, and the Princes Xavier and Charles, left this Place to go to Leipzig Fair.

Whitehall, April 26, 1755.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, on Wednesday the 12th of March last, betwixt Eight and Nine in the Evening, five Men broke into the House of Sir Hervey Elwes, Bart. at Stoke in Suffolk, and, by Threats, did oblige him to shew them where his Money was, which they carried away, to the Amount of about One Thousand Pounds, and did wound one of his Servants; they were all armed with Pistols and Cutlasses, shabbily dressed; one was a tall thin Man booted; two were short thin Men without Boots; these three had Masks on the whole Time; one of the other two was about forty Years of Age, full faced, fresh coloured, his Complexion inclined to fair, thick set, about five Feet four Inches high, had no Mask on for some Time, was without Boots; the other was thin bodied, long visaged, of a pale Complexion, believed to have a Scar on the lower Part of his Face, appeared to be about Thirty, five Feet five Inches high, booted, he had no Mask on for some Time: It is believed that a Sixth stood without, the Servant, that was attacked at the Stable, seeing a Man there, who, he thinks, was not amongst those that came into the House, and he heard one say, that he would stand at the Hall Door: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robbery, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

General Post-Office, April 22, 1755.

Whereas the Post-Boy, carrying the Derby Mail, that was dispatched from this Office on Saturday the 19th Instant, was attack'd between Market Harborough and Kibworth, on Sunday Night the 20th Instant, about Eleven o'Clock, by two Men on Foot, who seized on his Horse's Bridle, and led him to an Hedge about one hundred Yards distant from the Road, where they took off, and rifled the Mail, and took out and carried off the following Bags, viz.

The Boy saith, one of the Robbers was a middle-sized thin Man, and the other a fat jolly tall Man: The middle sized Man had on a light colour'd Coat, and wore his own Hair, which was black, and Part of it platted and pulled over his Face, and his Hat slouched before,

and was seemingly a genteel Man. The fat jolly tall Man had on a grey Wigg and Snuff colour'd Coat, and his Hat slouched before. After the Robbery they immediately mounted their Horses, which were tied to the abovementioned Hedge, and rode with full Speed towards Harborough. The Boy adds, that one of the Horses was of a grey Colour, and the other a darkish Colour.

This is therefore to give Notice, that whosoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, both or either of them who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen, or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice, or knowing of this Robbery, shall make Discovery whereby either or both of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice; such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of either or both of the said Robbers, be entitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.
