P R E S E N T,

The Lords Justices in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-sixth of April last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily Enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying Rewards to Persons discovering any Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon this Day: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some longer Time—The Lords Justices do therefore Order, and it is hereby Ordered, with the Advice of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, that the Bounty of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, of Forty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, and of Twenty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall enter themselves in the Royal Navy on or before the Twenty-fourth Day of June next; and that the Reward of Forty Shillings to Persons discovering any Able Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's said Service, be likewise continued to be paid until the said Twenty-fourth Day of June next inclusive.—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Madrid, May 22. The Count de Torre Palma, who is appointed to replace Count Azlor in the Post of Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from this Court to that of their Imperial Majesties, has received his last Instructions, and is preparing to set out for Vienna.

Fraustadt, May 22. Yesterday the King arrived here from Dresden, and this Day his Majesty gave Audience to the Turkish Envoy Extraordinary, who is to have his Audience of Leave next Monday, and on Tuesday he sets out on his Return to Constantinople. The King intends leaving this City the same Day, on his Return to Dresden.

Rome, May 24. The Margrave of Brandenburg Bareith having seen every Thing remarkable in this City and its Neighbourhood, set out Yesterday for Naples, where he is to be joined by the Margravine his Spouse. Cardinal Caraffa, Dean of the Sacred College, who was greatly recovered from his late Indisposition, is relapsed, and given over by his Physicians.

Breslau, May 29. During this Month we have had here, and in the neighbouring Districts, very violent Storms, which have greatly damaged the Fruits of the Earth. On Monday

last died, in the 26th Year of her Age, the Countess Maria-Theresa, Spouse to Count Maximilian of Lamberg.

Copenhagen, May 29. The King, accompanied by the Prince Royal, went on Sunday to the Camp in this Neighbourhood, and saw the several Regiments of which it is composed. His Majesty expressed the greatest Satisfaction at their Appearance, and intends to visit the Camp daily to see them perform their Exercise.

Copenhagen, June 3. Their Majesties and the Royal Family removed Yesterday from Friedensberg to Frederichsberg, where 'tis said they will stay till the End of the Month. To-morrow the King is to make a general Review of the Troops lately encamped near Friedensberg. The two Men of War that have been equipping for some Time in this Port, in order to cruize in the Mediterranean, put to Sea last Wednesday, and as the Wind has since continued favourable, it is not doubted but that they have already passed the Sound.

Berlin, June 3. On Wednesday last the King, accompanied by Prince Henry, Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, and several General Officers, set out for Starguard, where his Majesty reviewed the next Day the Regiments of Foot of Anhalt Dessau, Brunswick Beverl, Jeetz, Uchtlander and Amstel; that of Horst of Schwedt; and those of Dragoons of the Margrave Bareith, Ahlentann, and Prince Frederick Eugene of Wurtemberg, which were all assembled there for that Purpose.

Hanover, June 6. A great Number of Foreign Nobility and Gentry are arrived here, in order to be present at the Review that is to be made by his Britannick Majesty on Monday next in the Plain of Bult.

Paris, June 6. Last Sunday Cardinal Rochefoucault, the Archbishops of Narbonne, Embrun and Auch, and the Bishops of Bayeux, Langres, Grenoble and Montpellier, Presidents of the General Assembly of the Clergy of France, with the other Prelates and Deputies of the Second Order which compose that Assembly, had an Audience of the King at Versailles; after which they were introduced to the Queen and the rest of the Royal Family, and at Night they returned hither. And on Wednesday the Count de St. Florentin, Minister and Secretary of State, the Sieur Sechelles, Minister of State, and Comptroller General of the Finances, and the Sieur Amboile, Counsellor of State, and Intendant of the Finances, went to the Assembly of the Clergy in Quality of the King's Commissaries, and were received with all the Ceremonies usual on the like Occasions. On Saturday last the Body of the late Marshal Lowendahl was interred with great Solemnity in the Church of St. Sulpice. The Regiment of Foot, which that General commanded, is given to the young Count his Son, who is permitted to reside in his Father's Apartment in the Palace of Luxembourg.
