Constantinople, May 17.

ON the 5th Instant, the Captain Bawshaw or High Admiral put to Sea from this Port with four Men of War and six Gallies for the Islands of the Archipelago, to collect the yearly Tributes paid by the Inhabitants to the Grand Signior.

Genoa, June 5. Two Gallies sailed from hence last Thursday for Corsica, with a Number of Troops on board, to reinforce the Garrisons of Bastia, Ajaccio and Calvi.

Leghorn, June 7. We are informed by Letters from Naples, that an Algerine Polacre, which had greatly interrupted the Navigation between Sicily and Calabria, was taken towards the End of last Month by a Neapolitan Chebeck; and that the Crew, consisting of 50 Men, were made Slaves.

Vienna, June 14. Their Imperial Majesties are returned to Laxembourg, where they frequently take the Diversion of hunting. The Court has sent Commissaries to Lintz, in order to make the necessary Preparation, for rebuilding the Barracks destroyed by the late Fire. We have received Advice from Croatia, that since the Authors of the late Disturbances have been secured, the Tranquility of that Province is re-established.

Berlin, June 17. The King, before his Departure for East Frizeland and the Dutchy of Cleves, made a great Military Promotion, when, amongst others, Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick had the Command of the Regiment of Foot of the late Lieutenant General Bonin conferred on him; and he is likewise appointed Governor of Magdebourg. Baron d'Ahlfeld, the Danish Minister at this Court, having been for some Time past in an indifferent State of Health, is gone, by the Advice of his Physicians, to Pymont, to drink the Waters of that Place.

Bonn, June 19. The Elector our Sovereign, accompanied by Baron de Roll, his Highness's Master of the Horse, Father Kellerhofen his Confessor, M. Muller, Director of the Finances, and two or three other Persons of Distinction, set out from hence this Morning for Munich.

Brussels, June 20. Prince Charles of Lorraine, our Governor General, set out Yesterday Morning on a Tour to Mons, in order to pass two or three Days with the Princess his Sister.

Hanover, June 20. The Princess of Hesse-Cassel is expected To-morrow at Herrenhausen with the three Princes her Sons. On Monday last arrived here the Dutchess Dowager of Mecklenbourg Mirow, and the next Day continued her Journey for Pymont, where she is going to drink the Waters.

Paris, June 25. Baron Van Eyck had Yesterday his first publick Audience at Versailles, in which he delivered his Credential Letters as Envoy Extraordinary to this Court from the Elector of Bavaria, and was afterwards entertained at Dinner, at a Table prepared, as is usual on such Ceremonies, by his most Christian Majesty's Order, at which all the Foreign Ministers, and several other Persons of Distinc-

tion, were invited. M. Dupleix, the late Governor of Pond'cherry, is arrived at Port L'Orient, and is expected this Week in Paris.

Dublin, June 24.

Last Sunday being the Anniversary of His Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, the Great Guns were fired at His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. And Yesterday at Noon his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction on the Occasion; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
