Naples, May 27.

THE Marquês de Fogliani, Viceroy of Sicily, being on his Departure for that Kingdom, has been for some Days past taking Leave of the principal Persons of this City. Yesterday the Margrave of Brandebourg-Baireith arrived here, and the Margravine his Spouse is daily expected; but as they travel incognito, they cannot receive the Honours due to their high Birth. We have received an Account, that a Tripolitan Chebeck, on board of which were thirty Christian Slaves, whom the Master was necessitated to employ in working the Ship during a violent Tempest on their Return to Tripoly, had been carried by those Slaves into the Port of Trapani in Sicily, where the Master and his Crew were put in Irons, and the Christians set at Liberty.

Constantinople, June 2. On the 17th past we had a violent Fire near the Jews and Greeks Quarter, called Ballat, which began before Eight in the Evening, and continued burning until Six the next Morning. The Number of Houses destroyed is very considerable, but mostly of poor Jews and Greeks. The next Day produc'd a sudden Change; our Vizir Aly Pascha Echim Oglu was deposed, after 51 Days Continuance in that Post: As a Galley was not ready to carry him off immediately, he lay that Night in the Light House or Watch Tower we call Leander's Tower, and from thence was sent to Cyprus. The Selichtar Aga, or Sword-bearer to the Grand Signor, was also deposed at the same Time, and is since come out of the Seraglio with the Honour of three Tails, the Paschalick of Heydin, and in the Post of Nisfangi, or he who is entrusted with the Grand Signor's Signature. Nailly Abdulah Efendi the Jesterdar, received the Seals as Vizir: He was bred up in the Business of the Offices from his Infancy. The latter End of 1747 he attained to the Post of Reis Efendi, in which he was succeeded by the Present. He is perfectly acquainted with Business, and is a Man of great Prudence, and peaceable Disposition. Aly Pascha's Cheaia shared the Fate of his Master, and is kept in close Confinement until Accounts are adjusted; and one Jegén Efendi, who had before declined that Office, was obliged to accept

of it. The Foreign Ministers Audiences of the Vizir began on the 22d, and finished on Sunday the 25th. M. Vergennes, Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the Court of France, arrived here on the 22d, and the next Day notified his Arrival to all the Foreign Ministers. He had his Audience of the Vizir on Saturday, and is to have that of the Grand Signor To-morrow. The same Day a double Pay, consisting in about 2400 Purfes, or 1,200,000 Dollars, is to be distributed to the Soldiery. The Fast of Rameran begins on the 9th Instant.

Stockholm, June 3. The Court is still at Ulrichsdahl, but their Majesties intend to remove next Friday to Drottningholm, where they propose staying till August. Count Solms, who is to replace M. Malzhan as Envoy from the King of Prussia to this Court, is daily expected here from Berlin. M. Celsing, who is gone with a Letter from his Swedish Majesty to the Grand Signor, to compliment him on his Advancement to the Ottoman Throne, carried with him several magnificent Presents for his Sublime Highness and the principal Ministers of his Court. General Count During, Governor of this City, has been so dangerously ill for some Days past, that his Physicians have very little Hopes of his Recovery. The King has disposed of the Government of the Province of Westmorland in Favour of Colonel Cronhiord.

Copenhagen, June 13. The Troops encamped in this Neighbourhood are regularly exercised as in Time of War. Last Wednesday the King dined with General Nummefen in his Tent; after which his Majesty went with the said General to see the Form of Springing a Mine, and in the Evening returned to Frederichberg. This Morning his Majesty went again to the Camp, and dined in the Tent of the Chamberlain Count Plessen, Colonel of the Horse Guards.

Hambourg, June 13. We are informed by Letters from Peterbourg, that the Envoy Extraordinary from the Grand Signor is on his Departure for Constantinople, and that he is to be soon followed by Prince Dolgoroucki, whom her Imperial Majesty has appointed to compliment the new Sultan. The same Letters add, that the University lately established at Moscow, was opened on the 7th of last Month with great Solemnity.

Rome, June 24. A few Days ago the Pope's Gallies sailed from Porto d'Anzio on a Cruise against the Barbary Pirates. On the 7th Instant the Pope went from Castel Gandolfo to visit Cardinal Guadagne at his Abbey of Grotta Ferrata, by which he was magnificently entertained, as well as his Retinue and Guards. On the 8th the Margrave and Margravine of Batsch returned to this City from Naples, and is so said, will stay here till the Festival of St. Peter, the 28th Instant.

Plorence, June 21. Till the last Week M. Du Meuil, Major of the Emperor's Body Guard, called la Garde Noble, surrendered himself into Arrest in one of the Fortresses, in Consequence of an immediate Order from Vienna, for having taken upon him the Command of that Corps, in Prejudice of the Chevalier des Sales his Superior Officer, and on whom his Imperial Majesty has conferred that Command *pro interim*. On the 12th Instant the Prince Corsini, and his Brother, arrived here from Bologna. On the 16th Count Riechcourt returned here from the Pish Baths.

Lisbon, June 16. Lord Bruce arrived on Tuesday last at Antigola, and was the next Day presented to their Catholic Majesties, who received him in a very gracious Manner; after which he was entertained at Dinner by M. Wall, his Catholic Majesty's first Secretary of State, Baron Hildebrand, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Court of Sweden, had his first Audiences on the 13th Instant, wherein he presented his Credential Letters to their Catholic Majesties.
