Naples, June 17.

THE Marquess de Fogliani, who set out last Sunday, in order to take Possession of his Post of Viceroy of Sicily, performed the Functions of his Office of Prime Minister for the last Time on the 10th Instant, when the Marquess Tannucci took upon himself the Management of the Apartment of Foreign Affairs, and the Marquess Gregori those of War and Marine.

Madrid, June 17. Last Friday the Chamberlain Baron Hildebrand, the new Swedish Minister to this Court, had his first private Audience of their Majesties at Aranjuez, to which he was conducted with all the Ceremonies usual on such Occasions.

Naples, June 18. The King, besides the appointing the Marquess Tannucci to be Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and the Marquess Gregori for those of War and Marine, has thought proper to name the Marquess de Brancaccio to be Secretary of State for Ecclesiastical Affairs.

Genoa, June 20. The two Gallies that sailed lately from hence for Corsica, with a Body of five or six hundred Men, to augment some of the Garrisons in that Island, are returned into Port, and are ordered to be immediately refitted. We are informed by the Master of an English Ship that arrived in this Port a few Days ago from the Coast of Sardinia, that the Count de la Trinite, Viceroy of that Island, who embarked here lately on board a Vessel bound for Cagliari, is at length arrived there, after having suffered extremely in two violent Tempests, in which he was in the utmost Danger of being lost.

Milan, June 24. Cardinal Pozzoboni, our Archbishop, has ordered publick Prayers to be put up in all the Churches of this City, beseeching the Almighty to send us Rain, the great Drought we have had for some Time past having almost destroyed the Fruits of the Earth.

Stockholm, June 27. On Tuesday last the King and Queen, and the Prince Royal, arrived at Drottningholm from their late Tour to Eckolmsund and Sala, at which last Place they went to see the Silver and Copper Mines; and the next Day the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, went to Drottningholm to compliment their Majesties on their Return.

Marseilles, June 27. We have received a Confirmation of an Insurrection happening lately at Algiers, in Favour of some of the Members of the Divan, who were divested of their Employments on a Supposition that they were no Friends to the Party who engaged the Regency to declare War against the Imperialists and Dutch; but that this Revolt had caused no Revolution in the State; and that the Dey, to prevent the like for the Future, had ordered

the Guards of his Palace to be considerably augmented; and several of the Militia, who excited the People to this Insurrection, have been severely punished.

Vienna, June 28. They are working with great Diligence at the Repairs ordered to be made at the Castle, in order that the same may be finished before the End of September, when her Imperial Majesty is expected there to lye in.

Munich, June 29. The Duke de St. Elizabeth, Envoy from the King of the Two Sicilies to the King of Poland, Elector of Saxony, passed through this City a few Days ago on his Return from Naples to Dresden, in order to execute the Functions of his Ministry.

Berlin, July 3. The King arrived here last Monday from Potzdam, and set out the next Day for Spandau, to visit the Prince of Prussia. His Majesty has conferred the Government of Peitz on Lieutenant General Count Schmettau, in the Room of Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, who was some Time since appointed Governor of Magdebourg.

Paris, July 4. The King is arrived at Compiagne with the Queen and the young Princesses. His Majesty, in his Journey from the Castle of the Muette to that Palace, honoured the Sieur de Machault, Keeper of the Seals, with his Presence at his Country Seat at Arnouville.

Bonn, July 7. The Elector, before his Departure for Munich, appointed Count Hohenzollern to have the Government of this Electorate during his Absence.

Hamburgh, July 8. The Bishop of Lubeck came to Town the 3d Instant, passed the Day with the Dutchess of Holstein, his Serene Highness's Mother, who then entered into the 74th Year of her Age, and returned the Day following to his Residence at Eutin. M. de Soltikoff, who succeeds Prince Galliczin in this Residence as Envoy Extraordinary from the Empress of Russia, arrived here a few Days ago.
