Naples, July 1.

LAST Week the Court came from Portici, and 'tis said their Majesties will go shortly to Caserta, in order to spend some Time. The King has declared his Intention of speedily making a numerous Promotion of Military Officers. His Majesty has conferred on the Marquess de Fogliani, Viceroy of Sicily, the Title of Captain General, in Consideration of his good Services whilst he was at the Head of publick Affairs. Four of the King's Gallies are sailed from hence on a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates, who greatly interrupt the Navigation in the Seas of Calabria.

Stockholm, July 8. Strict Enquiry is making, by Order of the Court, after the Persons who lately stoppt the Courier that was carrying Dispatches from hence to Russia, and a large Reward is offered for apprehending them. The King has conferred on M. Cronstedt, Director of the Fortifications, the Rank of Lieutenant General; and the Post of first Auditor of the Accompts of the Army in Finland, is conferred by his Majesty on M. Hagert. They have already begun, in several Provinces of this Kingdom, to nominate Deputies to assist at the next General Diet.

Genoa, July 12. On the 6th Instant arrived an English Vessel from Algiers, and brought Letters of the 23d past, which advise the Arrival there of a Sweeds Ship and French Polacca from Constantinople, with Presents from the Grand Signior for that Regency; the Sweeds Cargoe consisted of 5000 Cannon Balls, 500 Bomb Shells, 500 Quintals of Hemp, 500 ditto of Rosin, 500 Pair of long and 500 Pair of short Oars, 20 Pieces of Brass Cannon, four Mortars and four Masts; and the French Polacca's consisted of 3000 Cannon Balls, and 2000 Quintals of Gun Powder. The same Letters mention, that their Cruizers had been very unsuccessful, since their Declaration of War against the Imperialists and the Dutch. On the 6th Instant in the Morning arrived here, his Britannick Majesty's Ship Unicorn, Captain Mathew Buckle, in nine Days from Mahone, and sailed again the next Evening to join Commodore Edgcumbe at Villa Franca. Letters from Bastia of the 4th Instant advise the Arrival there of M. Midon, an Engineer sent by this Republick to inspect the Fortifications in their Possession on the Island, and particularly

those of Bastia. The Inhabitants of Olmita, in the Province of Cape Corse, refusing to pay the annual Tribute to the Collectors for the Republick, and having written a disrespectful Letter to the Commiffary General Marquis Doria, a Detachment of Soldiers was sent and landed under Cover of the Galleys, and took several of the Malecontents Prisoners, whom they carried to Bastia. The Chiefs of the Malecontents have published an Edict, and appointed Collectors to receive the Corn and Fruits belonging to the Bishop and Canons of Bastia, and those of the Procoi belonging to the Genoese Families.

Munich, July 12. Last Thursday, being fixed for celebrating the Marriage of the Princess Mary with the Margrave of Baden-Baden, by his Proxy the Elector our Sovereign, the whole Court went in the Evening to the Chapel in the Palace, where the Cardinal de Bavaria, in his Pontifical Habit, gave the Nuptial Benediction; after which they returned to the Apartments in the Palace, where there was a grand Supper, and afterwards a Ball.

Copenhagen, July 12. The King arrived here last Tuesday Night with a numerous Retinue. The next Day his Majesty went to view the Ships on the Stocks at the Old and New Holm, and in the Afternoon returned to Friedensbourg. On Sunday last a Vessel, richly laden from the West-Indies, arrived in this Port.

Vienna, July 12. On Sunday last, after Divine Service, their Imperial Majesties gave divers Audiences, and signed some Dispatches; and on Monday Morning they set out for Schlohoff, where they propose to spend some Days in Hunting.

Augsbourg, July 17. The Princess Mary of Bavaria, Spouse to the Margrave of Baden-Baden, who left Munich last Monday Morning, dined that Day at the Abby of Furstensfeldt, and lay that Night at Friedberg. The next Day at Noon her Highness passed by this City, and was complimented upon her Marriage by a Deputation from our Magistrates, who presented her with a Purse of 1000 Ducats. By the Route her Highness proposes to take, she will reach Raftadt by Saturday next, where she will be received by the Margrave her Spouse.

Cologne, July 18. The Prince Bishop of Augsbourg, who has been for some Weeks at Aix-la-Chapelle, arrived here on Wednesday last.

Madrid, July 14. Their Catholick Majesties are expected this Evening at their Palace de Buen-Retiro from Aranjuez. On the 14th past died at Xerer de la Frontera, in the 74th Year of his Age, Don Thomas Geraldino, one of his Catholick Majesty's Supreme Council of the Indies, and formerly Minister Plenipotentiary to the Court of Great-Britain.

The Case of a Shepherd near Lincoln, published at the Request of the Rev. Mr. Willis.

THE Rev. Mr. Francis Willis, of Dunstan near Lincoln, was desired some time ago to visit one Isaac, a Shepherd, at that Place, in order to read the departing Prayer; and went about Ten in the Morning, and found him lying speechless, with his Tongue hanging out of his Mouth. Upon Enquiry, his Wife told Mr. Willis, her Husband had lost his Senses for five Days last past. He was extremely hot, his Tongue very clean and of a good Colour, and his pulse regular, but very strong; he had no Stool for eight or nine Days; and a Blister, which they had laid on five Days before, did not rise. Mr. Willis told his Wife, if she would be sure to follow his Directions, he did not doubt but he could do him good, by giving him some Powders (meaning Dr. James's) which he had by him: She promised fair, and he ordered her to give him a Clyster immediately, and apply a Blister to his Back and Head.
