THE 3d of August 1754, it was notified to the Executors, by the Owners in the Ship Catharine Elizabeth, belonging to this Place, that Capt. Niles Bie, who commanded it, was de- ce- fed in Laurhullen, in the Southern Part of Nor- way, and in which Port the Ship lay, desiring that the Court might take the Effects he was possessed of in this Place in his surviving Widow's Habitation, under its Sale; which was done the same Day at her Lodging in the Suburb of the Bay, where the Papers were sealed up, and the Moveables that were found were written down and appraised, notwithstanding the Widow alledged that they were her Son Peter Hol- erson's Property, and borrowed of him for Use. The 12th of February 1755, one of the Owners of the aforesaid Ship Catherine Elizabeth, namely Mr. Jens Nicholai Rohult, notified, that the late Niles Bies's Widow, Margretta Holm, was then deceas'd, wherefore, after her, likewise was sealed up, and the little wearing Apparel found after her, registr'd and appraised, as well as the wearing Apparel and traveling Accoutrements come here with the Ship; which on Capt Niles Bies's Demise were, by the Executor of the Pl ce, Counsellor of Justice, and Sheriff Braunmann, written down, and sealed up, re- gister'd and appraised: Now whereas all the Owners of the said Ship desire, that Capt. Niles Bies, and his Wife Margretta Holm, deceas'd, may be publish- ed in the Gazettes and News Papers, to be made know both at Home and Abroad; and that Credi- tors and btors to their Affairs may be called in against a cer n Day; They are accordingly warn'd by these Preten to meet in the aforesaid Mr. Jens Nicholai Rohult's Dwelling-house here in Dronthon, within a Year and six Weeks from the Date hereof, wh the Vouchers of each, and their Allegations in r' cir Tu as they come in, shall be regiter'd in the Executor Book, and every one fare as the Law and Right d'ctate.
