*Constantinople, June 16.*

**O**N the 8th Instant the Mufti Irani Abdullah Efendi was deposed, and Damazade Efendi has succeeded him. Every Thing continues here perfectly quiet.

*Lisbon, July 15.* On the 7th Instant, the French Squadron, under the Command of Count de Gay, which anchored in this River on the 19th past, set sail with a fresh Northerly Wind for the Southward. By common Report they are bound directly for Cadiz. On the 29th past, Senhor Dom Juan, the late Infant Dom Francisco's natural Son, kissed the King's Hand, upon his having been appointed to command the three Ships of War equipping in this Harbour to cruize against the Algerines, who of late have greatly infested the Coasts of Portugal. The Lord Bruce arrived here two Days ago from Madrid, and is shortly to be presented to the Royal Family by his Britannick Majesty's Minister at this Court.

*Turin, July 19.* His Sardinian Majesty set out on Thursday Morning for the Baths of Vaudieres, where his Majesty proposes to stay three Weeks. The Day before the King went, the following Promotions were declared at Court. His Excellency the Marquis Pallavicini was made Great Master of the Artillery, Count Briguerasque, formerly Vice-Roy in Sardinia, was appointed Governor of Tortona, in the Room of his Excellency the Commander Barol, nominated to be Governor of the Citadel of Turin, which Employment had been long vacant. Count d'Entremont, a younger Brother of the Marquis des Marches, is made Captain of the first Company of Life-Guards called the Savoyards, which the Marquis de Salle enjoyed, who has resign'd on Account of his Age. The Chevalier Occhis is created Governor of Suze; M. d'Esouliers, Commandant in Savoy; M. Guibert, late Captain of the Galleys, Chief of the Naval Squadron; and M. Wagenem, Colonel of the Regiment of Savoy.

*Madrid, July 21.* On the 10th Instant died here, in the 79th Year of his Age, Don Francisco Perez de Prado y Cuesta, Bishop of Teruel, Inquisitor-General; to which Employment his Catholic Majesty has since been pleased to nominate Don Manuel Quintano Bonifaz, Archbishop of Pharsalia, and, lately, Administrator to the Infant Don Luis, for the Spiritualities of the Archbishoprick of Toledo. Letters from Cadiz of the 15th advise, that on

the 13th arrived there from Lisbon, the French Squadron, consisting of six Ships of the Line, and three Frigates; and that it was said, they were to proceed from thence to Malaga. Some Days before, two Swedish Men of War, of 60 Guns, likewise arrived there, in their Way to Algiers. The same Letters mention, that the Harvest in that Province had been this Year the greatest that ever was known; and that, notwithstanding the Scarcity of the last Year's, Permission had been granted for the Exportation of 60000 Fanegas of Corn from Seville.

*Venice, July 25.* On Saturday last died here, aged 73, Signor Cavalier Bragadin, one of the Procurators of St. Mark; and on Tuesday Signor Cavalier Francesco Morosini was chosen by the Great Council Procurator in his Room. The same Day the Margrave and Margravine of Bareith received the usual Regale made by the Republick to Sovereign Princes here, and in the Evening left this Place on their Return to Bareith.

*Hanover, July 27.* Count Haslang, Minister from the Elector of Bavaria, is arrived here from England; as is also Count Colorado from the Imperial Court.

*Hambourg, July 29.* The Dutchess of Holstein has received the News of the Death of her Sister-in-Law, the Abbess of Quedlimburgh, in the 78th Year of her Age; and the Princess Amelia, Sister to the King of Prussia, succeeds as Abbess of that Chapter, having been chosen Coadjutrix to the late Princess of Holstein some Years ago. The Grand Duke has conferred the Key of Chamberlain upon the Baron de Stambke, his Imperial Highness's accredited Minister in this Residence, for the Affairs of Holstein. The Hereditary Prince and Princess of Mecklembourg, accompanied by Prince Lewis, their Brother, and the Princess he lately married, (a Princess of Cobourg) are come to pass a few Days at Hamburgh.

*Hambourg, Aug. 1.* Baron Scheffer, the Swedish Envoy at the Court of France, is arrived here from Paris, on his Way to Stockholm.

General Order.

WHEREAS in and by an Act of Parliament made in the 4th and 5th Years of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, intituled, An Act for the better collecting Charity-Money on Briefs by Letters Patent, and preventing Abuses in Relation to such Charities, It is enacted to the Effect following, viz. That upon issuing forth such Letters Patent, Copies thereof, to the Number required by the Petitioners for such Briefs, or their Agents, and no more, shall be printed by the King's Printer, who shall deliver the whole Number of such Copies to such Person only as shall by and with the Consent of the Petitioners for such Briefs, or the major Part of them, undertake the laying and disposing of such Printed Copies, in order to the Collection of the Monies to be received thereon, as in and by the said Act doth more at large appear. And whereas of late the Undertakers have sometimes carried on such Undertakings, and made Collections on such Briefs without having obtained the Consent of the Petitioners for such Briefs, or the major Part of them, for so doing, pursuant to the said Act, which hath given Occasion to Contention and Litigation tending to great Expence, and to the Prejudice of the said Charity: Now, for avoiding the like Inconveniences for the Future, I do Order, That to all Petitions for Briefs hereafter to be presented, there shall be annex a Copy of the Appointment made by the Petitioner or Petitioners for such Brief, or the major Part of them, of some Person or Persons to be the Undertaker or Undertakers for the laying and disposing of the printed Copies of such Briefs; which Copy shall (amongst other Things) contain the Names of all the Persons signing such original Appointment, and shall be verified by Affidavit to be a true Copy, and such Affidavit shall also exprefs, that the Names or Marks of the several Persons signing such original Appointment, are of their own Hand writing respectively: And I hereby Order, that all the printed Copies of every such Brief shall be delivered to such Person or Persons as shall be mentioned in such Copy of the Appointment, so verified as aforesaid, to be the Undertaker or Undertakers for the laying and disposing such

such printed Copies of such Brief, some or one of them, pursuant to the said Act. And whereas it frequently happens, that the Estimate of the Loss or Damage mentioned in the Certificate made by the Justices of the Peace in their Quarter Sessions, in order to such Briefs, doth not amount to a Sum sufficient in itself to bear the Expence thereof, whereby it becomes necessary, and has been constantly practiced to join two or more such small Estimates of Loss or Damage in one Brief, and to issue Letters Patents for the same, jointly, in order to divide the Burden of such Expence, and thereby alleviate the same to the Sufferers: I do hereby declare, That all the printed Copies of such conjunct Briefs shall be delivered to the Person or Persons appointed to be the Undertaker or Undertakers for laying and disposing the printed Copies of such Briefs by the Petitioner or Petitioners, or the major Part of them, the Estimate of whose Loss or Damage shall, by such Certificate of the Justices of the Peace, amount to the largest Sum; and such Person and Persons so appointed shall have the sole laying and disposing of all the printed Copies of such conjunct Briefs, and the sole Collection of the Money to be received thereupon; and I hereby further Order, that in all Cases wherein Default shall be made in observing these Regulations, the issuing of such Briefs shall be stayed; and this Order is forthwith to be affixed up in the Office of the Clerk and Secretary of the Briefs, and to be forthwith printed and published in the London Gazette.
