Naples, July 15.

ADVICE having been received at Court, that one of our Tartanes, laden with Corn, had been taken by an Algerine Corfair, two of the King's Chebecks were ordered immediately to sail in Quest of her; and coming up with her, a smart Engagement ensued, in which the Corfair was taken. Her Crew consisted of 113 Men, 60 of whom were killed, and the other 53 made Slaves. On our Side, we had only 8 Men killed, and about as many wounded.

Rome, July 19. The Abbe Ciozani, who has attended the Margrave and Margravine of Bareith during their Stay in this City, has been presented by them with a Snuff-Box set in Gold, containing a Bill of 100 Crowns, and has been appointed their Highnesses Agent with a suitable Salary. In the last Week Cardinal Tempini made his publick Entry into this City with the usual Formality, and on the 17th he received from the Pope the Cardinal's Hat and Ring, and Title of St. Guirico and Giulitta. On the 21st Instant the Pope held a Consistory, in which he disposed of several vacant Bishopricks in Foreign States, in Favour of diverse Prelates, agreeably to the Nomination of the respective Sovereigns. On the 23d Cardinal Valenti set out for the Baths of Viterbo.

Vienna, July 26. On Monday next their Imperial Majesties are to set out, with the Archduke Joseph, for the Seat of Count Caunitz-Rittberg at Austerlitz, to which Place the Count went three Days ago, in order to make Preparations for their Reception. Their Imperial Majesties propose to stay at Austerlitz till Friday next, and then to return hither.

Parma, July 26. The Court is still at Corjorno, but will remove in a short Time to Sala, where it is said they will continue till the Infanta Dutchess is near the Time of her Delivery.

Madrid, July 28. By Expresses from Cadiz, the Court has been informed, that the Ships the Conde, the Begonna, and the Diamond, from Vera Cruz, the San Pasqual from Carthagena, and the Amiable Maria from the South Seas, arrived in that Bay on the 16th and 21st Instant, with upwards of four Millions of hard Dollars in Money, and a Million in Cochineal, Indigo, and other valuable Merchandizes.

Munich, July 31. Part of the Baggage of the Chevalier de Follard, Minister from his most Christian Majesty to this Court, is already arrived with some of his Domesticks; but we are not as yet certain of the Time of that Minister's Arrival.

Florence, Aug. 2. In the last Week an Estafette from Vienna passed by this City, with Dispatches for Marquis Ginori the Governor of Leghorne. On the 30th in the Evening, Count Richecourt was taken ill of an Inflammation in his Throat, for which he was immediately let Blood, and continues much out of Order; on which Account there was no Council held on Thursday, and all Business is at a Stand.

Frankfort, Aug. 2. Yesterday the Elector Palatin arrived at Manheim, where he intends to stay till the 18th Instant, and then to set out for Duffeldorp. We hear by our last Letters from the Weteraw, that Baron Dahlberg, one of his Imperial Majesty's Chamberlains, and High Bailiff of Oppenheim, &c. was last Wednesday elected Burgrave of Friedberg, which Post has been vacant for some Time.

Bonn, Aug. 4. The Elector our Sovereign is expected to return here from Munich in about ten Days.
