*Whitehall, August 13.*

**T**HIS Morning arrived here from Hanover, one of His Majesty's Messengers with Orders for the Departure of the Yachts to Helvoetfluys, His Majesty having been pleased to declare His Intention to return speedily to England: And Directions are given for preparing the Palace at Kennington for His Majesty's Residence during the Remainder of the Summer.

*Petersbourg, July 18.* The Feast of St. Peter and Paul, whose Names the Great Duke and the young Great Prince bear, was celebrated with great Magnificence on the 10th Instant at the Castle of Oranienbaum, where the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes, repaired in rich Habits to compliment their Imperial Highnesses on that Occasion. The Envoy Extraordinary from the Grand Signior, who had his Audience of Leave of the Empress on the 25th past, made his last Visit to the Great Chancellor Count Bestuchef on Friday last, and is since preparing for his Return to Constantinople. The Presents this Court intend to make him before his Departure, amount to the Value of 5000 Rubles. Prince Dolgorowcki, whom her Imperial Majesty has appointed to compliment the new Sultan upon his Advancement to the Ottoman Throne, intends to set out for Constantinople the Beginning of next Month, for which Purpose the several rich Presents he is to carry with him for the Grand Signior, the Grand Vizier, and the principal Members of the Divan, are getting ready as fast as possible.

*Cracow, July 28.* On Wednesday last a Fire broke out in the Monastery of the Ladies of Visitation, which spread so fast, that it consumed, in a very short Time, five Churches, and about 70 Houses, with great Part of their Furniture. We have received an Account, that Count Charles de Brim-Opalskiy, Chief of one of the most illustrious Houses in Poland, died on Friday last at Gratz, in the Neighbourhood of Posnania, and having left no Male Issue, the Title and Estate descend to the Count his Brother.

*Lisbon, July 29.* On the 24th Instant the Fernambuco Fleet, consisting of 11 Merchantmen, arrived in this Harbour under Convoy of two Men of War, having been sixty-five Days in their Passage; and at the same Time arrived a Ship from Macao. The Treasure by the Men of War amounts to something more than 200000 Cruzados. The Effects by the Merchantmen consist in about 5000 Chests of Sugar, 43000 Hides, and about 5000 Quintals of Brazil Wood, besides several other Articles of small Importance.

*Turin, Aug. 2.* Count Viry set out the 29th of last Month for Hanover; he succeeds Count Perron in the Character of Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Great Britain. Yesterday his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy went to Court to review the Troops in that Garrison.

*Vienna, Aug. 2.* Their Imperial Majesties are expected this Night at Schonbrun, from their late Tour to Aufterlitz, the Seat of Count Caunitz-Rittberg.

*Copenhagen, Aug. 3.* The King, who went from Friedensbourg to Hirschholm last Tuesday, arrived here the same Night. The next Morning his Majesty went to the Arsenal to see a Piece of Cannon of a new Invention, and that Afternoon returned to Friedensbourg.

*Munich, Aug. 3.* Last Week the Count de Torrè-Palma, appointed to replace the Marquess d'Azlor in the Post of Minister Plenipotentiary from his Catholick Majesty to the Imperial Court, arrived here from Madrid, and will continue his Route in a few Days for Vienna.

*Bareith, Aug. 4.* The Margrave our Sovereign, who, after having passed some Time in the Southern Provinces of France, went with the Princess his Spouse to visit the principal Cities of Italy, returned here Yesterday.

*Berlin, Aug. 5.* The Court is gone into Mourning for three Weeks, on Occasion of the Death of the Princess Mary-Elizabeth of Holstein Gottorp, Abbess of Quedlinbourg. We are informed by our last Letters from Breslau, that the Count de Hochberg, Baron of Furstenstein, &c. died at Furstenstein on Tuesday last, in the 41st Year of his Age.

*Paris, Aug. 8.* The King having appointed the Count de Noailles, Grandee of Spain of the first Class, Knight of the Orders of the Golden Fleece and St. Lewis, and Bailiff and Grand Croix of Malta, to be his Ambassador Extraordinary to the King of Sardinia, he will accordingly set out towards the End of this Month for Turin.

*Hague, August 12.* By our last Dispatches from Soestdyk, her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, the young Prince Stadtholder, and the Princess Caroline, continue there in perfect Health. We are informed by Letters from Breda, that on Monday the 4th Instant there fell, in the Neighbourhood of Rosendaal, so great a Quantity of Hail, that it lay a Foot deep in some Places the next Day.
