A PROCLAMATION.

HARTINGTON.

WHEREAS the Lords Justices of Great Britain have signified unto us their Pleasure, that the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands Prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty Sixth Day of August Instant, be further Prorogued to Tuesday the Seventh Day of October next, then to meet and sit for the Dispatch of Business; We do therefore publish and declare, that the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is, hereby further Prorogued to Tuesday the Seventh Day of October next, and that the same shall be then held at Dublin, and sit for the Dispatch of Business: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice, and to give their Attendance accordingly.

GOD Save the KING.

Constantinople, July 17. The Ramezan is finished with great Order and Tranquillity, and was succeeded by the Bairam, at which Time it was usual, in the late Reign, to exhibit Shows and Spectacles to the People; but this Prince doth not think proper to imitate it; probably to prevent the prodigious Concourse of People which assemble on that Occasion. A very great and considerable Fire happened on the first Night of Bairam, between the 10th and 11th, near the Seraglio; it burnt for thirteen Hours successively, and did incredible Damage. The Grand Signor, and all the Ministers, attended with great Affiduity. Many large Se-

raglios are burnt down. Yesterday several considerable Changes were made in the subordinate Posts of the Ministry; the Chiause Baschi; Janiziar Efendisi, or Secretary to the Janizaries; Jerfana Emini, first Commissary of the Arsenal; Kadiliskeer of Romelia; Spahilar Chealazy, or Lieutenant General of the Spahys, with several other inferior Officers, were all deposed: The latter is succeeded by Sadick Aga, the late Great Master of the Horse. The Selichtar Aga, or Sword Bearer, was a few Days ago disgraced. Jahia Pascha is removed from the Beglerbeylick of Romelia, to the Paschalyck of Janina, and Achmet Pascha succeeds him. M. Ludolf, the Neapolitan Agent, has been named by his Court Envoy Extraordinary, to compliment the new Sultan; and Prince Dolghorouky has Orders to prepare for this Court, with a like Character and Commission from the Empress of Russia.

Naples, July 22. On Sunday in the Evening their Majesties went to the Great Market Place, to see the Fireworks that are annually played off there in Honour of the Madona del Carmine, at the Expence of the Shopkeepers of the said Market, when there was a great Concourse of People. A few Days ago the Duke of Bridgewater arrived here from Rome.

Naples, July 29. The King having thought proper to establish the Family of the two eldest Princes, has appointed the Prince of Santo-Nicandro to be their Governor; the Marquis Isastia, Sub-Governor to the Prince Royal; and M. Dufmet, Colonel of the Walloon Regiment of Antwerp, Sub-Governor to the Infant Don Carlo. The rest of the Officers that are to compose their Household, are not named as yet.
