At the Council-Chamber, *Whitehall*, the 26th Day of *August*, 1755,

P R E S E N T,  
The Lords Justices in Council.

It was this Day ordered by the Lords Justices in Council, that the Parliament, which stands Prorogued to Tuesday the Second Day of September next, should be further Prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty-third Day of the said Month of September.

*Lisbon*, July 21. Their Majesties and the Royal Family continue at Belem, where they frequently partake of the Diversion of Hunting. In Conformity to his Majesty's Orders, they are arming three Frigates in this Port to cruize against the Algerines, which will be ready to put to Sea in a few Days, under the Command of Don John, natural Son to the Infant Don Francis.

*Madrid*, July 22. M. Spinola, the Pope's new Nuncio to this Court, will make his publick Entry into this City the Beginning of September next. We hear from *Cadiz*, that the *Vigogne*, the *Diamond*, and the *Conde*, three Register Ships, are lately arrived at that Port.

*Petersbourg*, July 26. The Envoy Extraordinary from the Grand Signior set out from hence last Wednesday on his Return to Constantinople: He took his Route by *Czarkazelo*, in order to see the Palace at that Place. And Prince *Dolgoroucki*, whom her Imperial Majesty has named to compliment the new Sultan on his Advancement to the Ottoman Throne, is preparing to follow him in a few Days.

*Naples*, July 29. The Court will shortly remove to *Caserta* for the Remainder of the Summer, for which Purpose Orders are already sent to get every Thing in Readiness for the Reception of their Majesties and the Royal Family. They continue to raise Recruits throughout this Kingdom with great Success, so that 'tis imagined all our Regiments, both Horse and Foot, will be compleat in a short Time.

*Stockholm*, July 31. On Thursday last, being the Queen's Birth-Day, who then entered into the 36th Year of her Age, the same was observed as usual at *Drottningholm*; where the Senators, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes, repaired in rich Habits to compliment their Majesties on that Occasion.

*Ratisbon*, Aug. 9. We have received Advice, that the Prince, of whom the Princess,

Spouse to the Hereditary Prince of *Furstenberg*, was delivered on the 28th of last Month at *Doneschingen*, was baptized two Days after by the Name of *Jean-Joseph-Nepomucene*, the Ceremony being performed by the Prince Bishop of *Constance*.

*Hambourg*, Aug. 15. The Princess *Charlotte* of *Hesse*, (the only unmarried Daughter of the late Prince *Maximilian*) who has passed Part of the Summer at *Eutin* with her Highness's Sister the *Dutchess* of *Holstein*, is gone through *Hambourg* on her Return to *Cassel*: The Court of *Eutin* accompanied her Highness thus far, and intend to make a Stay of some Days with the *Dutchess* Dowager of *Holstein*.

*Berlin*, Aug. 16. Last Saturday there was a great Court at *Montbijou* to compliment the Prince of *Prussia* on his Birth-day, his Royal Highness then entering into the 34th Year of his Age: The Court goes out of Mourning To-morrow for the late *Abbes* of *Quedlinburg*; and on Monday next it goes into Mourning again for the late Prince of *Anhalt-Cothen*.

*Brussels*, Aug. 19. The French Troops are in Motion every where, and preparing to march into their several Camps; that at *Barkemont*, or *Aimerie* as others call it, is to be formed on the 26th Instant. The Prince of *Soubise*, who is to have the Command there, is at present at *Dunkirk*, to which Place he returned the 14th Instant. Besides the Augmentation of ten Men per Company which is to take Place immediately, the French Court has ordered four new Companies to be added to each Battalion of their National Troops, and to be ready against the Month of February. A great Number of cover'd Waggon's that were assembled here last Week for the Service of the Government, are now at *Willebroeck*, and in the Neighbourhood of *Malines*, from whence they began Yesterday to remove to *Namur* a large Train of Artillery, with a great Quantity of Gun-Powder, and other Military Stores of all Sorts, for the Defence of that Fortrefs.

*Brussels*, Aug. 22. The best and freshest Accounts we have from the Frontiers, confirm that the French Camp at *Aimerie* is to be entirely formed on the 26th Instant. The Prince of *Soubise* is to command there in Chief, *M. du Mesnil* as Lieutenant General, and the Prince of *Croy* as *Marechal de Camp*. Part of their Equipages, as well as those of the Intendant, were already arrived there, and the rest were following with great Diligence. The Prince of *Soubise* was to be at *Lille* as last Monday,

Monday, this Day at Valenciennes, and the 25th at the Camp, which is to consist of Sixteen Battalions and Twenty-eight Squadrons; and the Contractors for Bread and Forage are ordered to supply it for the whole Month of September. None of the Regiments that were encamped the preceding Years have received Orders to encamp this Year, either at Aimerie or at Richemont, nor have any Troops been as yet drawn out of the interior Provinces of France.

*Hague, Aug. 21.* By our last Advices from Soefdyk, her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, the young Prince Stadtholder, and the Princess Caroline, continue there in perfect Health; and it is thought her Royal Highness will come here some Day next Week.
