Rome, July 26.

WE have received an Account, that the Algerine Corsairs have taken two more Neapolitan Tartanes, laden with Corn, off Fiumicino; as also a small Genoese Vessel, with eleven Men on board, whom they carried into Slavery.

Erlangen, Aug. 8. The Margrave our Sovereign, who returned to Bareith a few Days ago from his late Tour to the Southern Provinces of France and the principal Cities of Italy, is expected here this Night, as is the Margravine his Spouse To-morrow, in order to partake of a great hunting Match the Beginning of next Week in the Neighbourhood of Schwabach, at which the Prince and Princess of Anspach are expected.

Vienna, Aug. 9. Several extraordinary Councils have been lately held at Schonbrun, upon the present critical Situation of Affairs in Europe. By Letters from Constantinople of the 15th of last Month we are informed, that a terrible Fire broke out in that City a few Days before, in the Quarter called Cumpi-Capi, which burnt with such Violence for several Hours, that upwards of 500 Houses were consumed, and many Persons perished in the Flames.

Turin, Aug. 9. Yesterday his Sardinian Majesty, accompanied by the Duke of Savoy, returned to Turin in perfect Health from Vaudieres, where his Majesty had been to make Use of the Baths.

Ratibdon, Aug. 12. The Session of the Diet is adjourned during the long Vacation, which lasts till towards the End of October next; and the Members of that august Assembly are almost all departed for their respective Country Seats.

Munich, Aug. 12. The Elector of Cologne, who has spent some Time at this Court, purposes to leave the same on Tuesday next.

Leipsick, Aug. 13. We are assured, that on the Day the Prince of Anhalt-Cothen died, Prince Charles George his Son took upon himself the Management of the Affairs of his Government; after which the Members of the Council, the Magistrates, and the Troops in Garrison at Cothen, took the Oaths of Fidelity to his Highness. The deceased Prince, who was 38 Years of Age, came to the Government of his Estates after the Death of Prince Leopold his Brother, which happened on the 19th of November 1728.

Dresden, Aug. 13. The King took the Diversion of hunting on Wednesday last, in which his Majesty was accompanied by the Princes Xavier and Charles. Count Vitzthum, lately appointed Minister from this Court to

that of France, in the Room of the late Count Bellegarde, intends to set out for Paris towards the End of the Month.

Dusseldorp, Aug. 15. According to our last Advices from Manheim, the Elector our Sovereign, and the Princess his Spouse, propose to set out next Sunday for this Place, and are expected here on the Thursday following. The Count de Warrenleben, Minister from the States General of the United Provinces, and the Count de Riaccourt, Envoy from the King of Poland, Elector of Saxony, are also expected here about the same Time.

Turin, Aug. 16. This Morning died, after a short Illness, tho' in an advanc'd Age, Madame Deshais, Governess to their Royal Highnesses the Princesses, very much regretted by all the Royal Family.

Cologne, Aug. 18. We learn from Treves, that the Elector of that Name, who has been greatly indisposed, is now perfectly recovered.

Hamburgh, Aug. 21. The Hamburgers have sent out this Year, eighteen Ships upon the Greenland Fishery, of which thirteen are returned with Forty-five Whales. And for the Seal Fishery, sixteen Vessels, which are all arrived, with pretty good Success.

Hague, Aug. 26. The States of Holland are still assembled, but their Noble Mightinesses will, it is thought, separate in a few Days. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante is still at Soestdyck, and the Time of her Return to this Place still uncertain. The Advices from the Frontier of Flanders and Brabant, confirm the March of the French Troops to the different Camps mark'd out for them, viz. at Aymerie, at Richemont, and near Dunkirk, where they are hard at Work to compleat the old, and make new Fortifications. It is uncertain whether the French Camps will be composed of more or fewer Troops than last Year, tho' all the Regiments in Garrison in the French Frontier Towns, are not order'd to encamp as yet. Notwithstanding all the Reports that have been spread to the contrary, it is very certain, that the Troops of their High Mightinesses, and of the Empress Queen, are still very quiet in the Towns of the Barrier, and the other Places of the Austrian Netherlands.
