Lisbon, July 29.

ON Thursday last the Fleet from Fernambuco arrived in this Port, having on board about 220,000 Crusades in Specie on the King's Account, and a very valuable Cargo of rich Merchandize for the Merchants.

Petersbourg, Aug. 2. The Empress and the young Great Prince Paul Petrowitz are still at Czarkazelo; and the Great Duke and Great Dutchess continue for the present at Oranienbaum. Colonel Guidickens, who has resided here for some Years in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Great Britain, set out last Monday Morning on his Return to London. Her Imperial Majesty has ordered the Sum of 100,000 Rubles to be remitted to the Governor of Moscow, with Orders to distribute the same amongst such of the Inhabitants of that City who suffered most by the late great Fires. The Prince of Holstein Beek, Lieutenant General of the Empress's Forces, is gone from Narva to Wybourg, in order to command, under General Schuwalof, the Body of Troops we have in Finland.

Vienna, Aug. 14. Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Birth of the Archdutchess Mary-Elizabeth, who then entered into the thirteenth Year of her Age, there was a great Court at Schonbrun of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment her Highness on that Occasion. Count Bentheim, the new Chancellor of Transylvania, took on Sunday last the usual Oaths of Fidelity for that important Post.

Munich, Aug. 15. Preparations are making at Nymphenbourg for celebrating To-morrow the Anniversary of the Birth of his Serene Highness the Elector of Cologne, whose Departure for Italy remains fixed for Tuesday next. They continue to make here, and in all the Churches of this Electorate, publick Prayers to Almighty

God for the Cessation of the heavy Rains which have lately fallen in this Country, and prevented the getting in the Harvest.

Copenhagen, Aug. 16. The King, who arrived here last Tuesday, set out on Thursday for Bregentwedt, the Seat of Count Molcke, Great Marshal of the Court, where he proposes to spend two or three Days. Last Week his Majesty took a Tour to Niebo, to examine the Works carrying on at that Port, which are very far advanced.

Versaille, Aug. 21. The King of Poland, Duke of Lorraine and Bar, arrived here last Tuesday from Luneville, in order to pass some Time with their Majesties and the Royal Family.

Dusseldorp, Aug. 22. We are informed by Letters from Mannheim of the 19th Instant, that the Elector our Sovereign intended to set out from thence as Yesterday with the Princess his Spouse, so that his Electoral Highness is expected here on Sunday next.

Paris, Aug. 23. Our Archbishop has ordered publick Prayers to be put up in all the Churches of this City, for the safe Delivery of the Dauphiness, who is expected to lye-in towards the End of October next. On Wednesday last died at Versailles, in the 81st Year of his Age, John-Francis Boyer, Bishop of Mirepoix.
