He happy faccess of his Majesties Arms, oc-casions a general rejoyche through all this Kingdom, it being now first, that we may with reason promise; our selves a good and honourable Peace with the Turks. Since the taking of the Town and Caffle of Barr, which opens the paffage into the Ukrain, the City of Mohilow on the Ditester, a place of very great importance, and which gives us a free entrance into Moldavia, hath furrendred to his Majesty, as likewise Stiana, and other places of And our Letters of the 20 pass from Leopol fay, that the King was on his march towards Braclaw, the Capital City of the lower Podolia; fo that in a short time we hope to see this Crown in possession again of the several places which have of late been taken by the Turks. In the interim endeavors are used to engage the Moscovites in an offensive War against the Ottomans, but they give us good words onely.

Stockholm, Decemb. 8. We are told of a Letter which his Majesty hath lately received from the Empefor, in which his Imperial Majesty seems with some surprize to take notice of his Majesties intention to depart from his Mediation, and to enter into the War, from which he uses several Arguments to divert his Majesty, declaring that in that case he shall be forced to employ his Arms for the affiftance of the Elector of Branden-burgh, or any other his Allies. At the fame time the Marquis de Feuquieres, Ambassador herefrom the most Christian King, continues his instances with great earnestness that his Majesty will give, effectual orders for the march of his Forces in Pomerania, as being the only means to dispose the Parties to a Pesce; which the faid Ambaffador protests the King his Master ardently desires, so it be established upon just and honourable terms. We are here in some impatience to hear of the arrival of Count Brahe at Copenhagen, and of the fuccels of his Negotiation there, the main Subject of which (as we are told) is, to persuade the King of Denmark to remain Neuter, in case this Crown shall be obliged to become a Party in the War. The Sieur Schaep, Envoy from the States General of the United Provinces, is preparing for his return home, having already taken his leave of their Majestics.

Vienna, Decemb. 16. The Secretary of Prince Lobe wits having upon his being the second time put to the Torture, confessed several matters; and particularly, that his Masker had held a correspondence with the Emperors Enemies, it is thought the faid Prince will now very fuddenly be criminally proceeded against, and in the mean time feveral Sums of money belonging to him Jave been seized by the Emperors order. The Count d Oxensterne Ambassador from Sueden, having this last week received a further answer from the Emperor to his late Memorials, the Sieur Puffendorff, who was Re-Adent here for that Crown, is parted with all diligence for stockhelm, to give his Majesty an account thereof.

The Duke of Saxen Lawenburg, Lieutenane General of the Forces of the Empire, is arrived here from Ratisbonne, and on Wednesday, last he was to pay his duty to the Emperor. The Spanish Ambassador at this Court has defired leave to raife 3000 men, in the Hereditary Countries, to be divided into two Regiments, for the fervice of the Spanish Netherlands. We are told that the States General of the United Provinces have by their Minister here, represented to his Imperial Majesty, that confidering things are very much changed, and that the War is at present maintained not upon their account, but for the interests of the Emperor and the other Allies; and on the other hands the great burthen that hath lay'n upon the United Provinces ever fince this War, it is but just they should be eased of the Subsidies which they have hitherto paid to several Princes for the keeping their Troops on foot, or at least that their proportion should be moderated. At Hamburgh, Decemb. 18. The Letters we have this

last Post from Pomeren say, that the match of the suedish Troops is countermanded; that those who marched from Wismar, have orders to return thither: but we know not well what credit to give hereunto feeing fome Suedes that are at present here, confidently assure us, that their Army will march some time the next month, and that they will be obliged thereunto, to feek new quarters, having wholly eaten up those they have at present in Pomerania. Our Letters from Dantzick are filled with an account of the fuccesses of the Poles in the 11krain, that King having already possessed himself of Barr, Mohilow, and other very confiderable places in those parts, and seems in a condition to carry the War even into the ancient Territory of the Ottomans. The Count de Brahe is hourly expected at Copenhagen from Sueden, and people are in some impatience to understand rightly the subject of his errand.

Midrid, Decemb. 19. The 11 instant; the new Counfellors of State (of whom we formerly told you) took their places in the Council, and amongst others, the Duke d' Ossuna, who was newly arrived from Milan. Here is no farther discourse of Don Fuan of Austria's passing over into Flanders, to take upon him the government of those Provinces, or of his stirring from the place where he now is; but it is still said that the Count de Monterey has obtained leave to quit that governament, and return hither. The latest advice from Sicily is, that the Messineses are in great want of provisions, to that degree, that some thousands of the poorest fort of the Inhabitants have been expelled the City as unneceffary and dangerous. From Gadiz they write, that Sir Fehn Narborough arrived there with the men of War under his command the 29 past, in 14 days from the Isle of Wight, and that on the fourth instant he proceeded towards Argiers, having with him five men of War. Our Letters from Libon fay, that feven French men of War and two Fireships were on that Coast, waiting, as was suspected, the Dutch Fleet homeward bound from Sesubal, with two men of War for their Convoy.
