Lisbon, July 29.

THE Court continues its Residence at Bellem, from whence the King comes once a Week to give Audience to the Ambassadors and Foreign Ministers. The Infanta Dona Marie-Anne-Francoise is fallen ill with the Small Pox; but as it is a favourable Sign, there is great Reason to believe she will soon recover.

Ratisbon, Aug. 12. On Tuesday last the Minister who resides here on the Part of the Duke of Saxe Gotha, went from hence by Water to Vienna, the great Quantity of Rain that has fallen in this Country for several Days past, having made the Roads impassable in many Places.

Rome, August 16. By Cardinal Millo's Direction, the Palace Madama, which the Pope purchased lately of the Emperor as Great Duke of Tuscany, is fitting up, in order to be made use of for the Office of the Datery. By the last Spanish Courier, M. Francolini, who carried the Cap to Cardinal Cordova, has acquainted the Pope, that besides the rich Presents which he had received from that Cardinal, he had obtained, by his Means, from the King of Spain, a Pension of 2500 Crowns per Annum. On the 9th Instant, the French Ambassador returned to this City from Viterbo, where, on the 7th, he went to visit Cardinal Valenti, who, it is said, by the Change of Air, and the Use of these Waters, finds great Benefit in his Health. The same Day Cardinal Alexander Albani dispatched a Courier to the Court of Vienna, with Notice of the Determination of a Congregation held before the Pope, relating to certain Prerogatives of the Elector of Mayence over the new Bishoprick of Fulda. Last Week the Pope's Gallies sailed on a Cruize to Terracina, &c. on Notice that some Barbary Corsairs had appeared on that Coast.

Dresden, Aug. 17. On Wednesday last, as Prince Xavier was hunting in the Neighbourhood of Seidnitz, his Horse fell under him, by which his Highness received a Contusion on his Left Side, which deprived him of his Speech for some Time. All the Nobility, who were present, were greatly alarmed at this Accident,

which however was attended with no fatal Consequences, his Highness, according to the Opinion of his Physicians, being quite out of Danger.

Naples, Aug. 19. The King was pleased to name last Week, six new Majordomo's of the Week, viz. the Count Gazola, the Chevalier Fardella, Count Michel Pignatelli, D. Salvator Nazelli, the Chevalier Franconi, and the Marquis Cinciglia. On Saturday last the four Maltese Gallies, commanded by the Bailli de Fleury, General of the same, came into the Port of Baia, where they are waiting for the two Men of War, that sailed with them from Malta under the Orders of the Commandeur de Combrieux. Upon their Arrival, these two Gentlemen, together with the Bailli Duegna, will take the Character of Ambassador, to compliment the King upon the late Accommodation.

Vienna, Aug. 22. Last Week the Count de Torre-Palma, the new Spanish Minister to this Court, had his first Audiences of their Imperial Majesties, and of the Archdukes and Archduchesses. Field Marshal Count Neuperg, who went some Time ago to Croatia, on Account of the Troubles in that Country, returned here on Friday last, and was admitted to an Audience of their Imperial Majesties the next Day, who were greatly satisfied with the Measures he had taken for securing the Tranquility of that Province.

Copenhagen, Aug. 23. The King, who went some Days ago to the Seat of Count Molcke, Great Marshal of the Court, at Bregentwed, came here last Tuesday Night. The next Day his Majesty went to see the Ships on the Stocks at the Old and New Holm, and on Thursday he dined with the Queen-Mother at Hirschholm, from whence he went the same Night to Friedensbourg.

Florence, Aug. 23. In Consequence of the the Honour which the Emperor has lately conferred on Marquis Ginori, Governour of Leghorn, of the Title and County of Urbeck, a Fief in Tuscany, on the 16th Instant the Regency forwarded to him the Emperor's Diploma, in order to his taking Possession of that County accordingly. ill of the Gout, and not having been able to assist at the usual Council-Days, all Business is for the present suspended.

Berlin, Aug. 25. The King, who arrived here on Monday last from Potzdam, returned thither on the Wednesday following, after giving Audience to a Gentleman of the Court of Barreith, who came to inform his Majesty of the Return of the Margrave and his Spouse from their late Tour into Italy.

Hambourg, Aug. 26. The Prince Bishop of Lubeck, and the Duke of Holstein-Augustebourg, are both arrived here, and propose to stay some Days.

Brussels, Sept. 2. The French Troops, which were to have encamped at Aimerie the 25th of last Month, received Orders, on the 24th, to remain in their Cantonments. This Delay was only owing, as we have been since informed, to the Badness of the Weather, and they marched into their Camp on the 27th, to the Number of Sixteen Battalions and Twenty-eight Squadrons. We are likewise informed, that the Camp at Richemont, which is also assembled, consists of Fifteen Battalions and Twenty-six Squadrons. We hear that the French have made an End of baking Biscuit at Douay, the Quantity they wanted being compleat. It is also said, that they have added Fourscore Hands to their Laboratory in that Town.

Brussels, Sept. 5. Several Austrian Officers have been to visit the French Camp at Aimerie, where they were presented to the Prince of Soubise, and were received by him, and the other General Officers, in the most polite Manner. We hear from thence, that the four Companies, to be added to each Battalion, are to be raised and cloathed at the King's Expence; and that the dismounted Companies in the Regiments of Dragoons, are to be immediately provided with Horses, so as to make four compleat Squadrons in each Regiment. It is likewise said, that the Troops in French Flanders will be augmented to, at least, Fifty-Thousand Men. By Letters dated the 3d Instant, we are informed, that on Account of the Badness of the Weather, the French broke up their Camp that Morning at Ten o'Clock, and marched into their former Cantonments, with an Intention however of returning again to their Camp, if the Weather will permit; having left their Tents standing, and a few Men to guard them.
