THIS Day the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, waited on his Majesty to congratulate him on his safe Return; and being introduced to his Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Grafton, Lord Chamberlain of his Majesty's Household, William Moreton, Esq; the Recorder, made their Compliments in the following Address.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord-Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, humbly beg Leave to address your Majesty with our most sincere and joyful Congratulations, on your Majesty's safe and happy Return to your British Dominions.

Permit us, Royal Sir, with Hearts full of Gratitude, to express our sincere Acknowledgments of your Majesty's paternal Care and vigilant Regard for the true Interest and Prosperity of your People, by the vigorous Measures taken by your Majesty to protect our Commerce and Colonies from the Incroachments of the French.

And we do humbly assure your Majesty, that we will, to the utmost of our Power, on this, and every other Occasion, cheerfully contribute towards the Support of your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, and the Defence of the just Rights and Possessions of your Crown, against all Attempts whatsoever.

To which Address his Majesty was pleased to return this most gracious Answer.

I Thank you for this very dutiful and affectionate Address. The Support of the Rights of my Crown, and the Preservation of my Dominions in America, are so essential to the Trade and Commerce of my People, that the City of London may depend, that I will continue to take such Measures, as may best tend to those great and important Ends. The Assurances you give me of

your Zeal and Assistance, are very pleasing to me; and the City of London may rely upon the Continuance of my Favour and Protection.

They were received very graciously, and had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand.

After which his Majesty was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on, William Moreton, Esq; Recorder. Samuel Fludyer, and John Torriano, Esqrs. Sheriffs.

Kensington, September 19.

This Day Prince Golitzin, Envoy Extraordinary from the Empress of Russia, had his first private Audience of His Majesty, to deliver his Letters of Credence; to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Holderness, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Constantinople, Aug. 1. The Ministry are at present in a State of Inactivity, occupied chiefly with the Ceremonials usually practis'd after Bairam. The Sultan does not affect to be a rigid Observer of the Etiquette established by his Predecessor; for, contrary to Custom, before he was treated by the Vizir, he went and surprized the old Customer at his Country-House. It is assur'd he accepted from that Officer, Presents of a lesser Value than what he usually gave on that Occasion; and that, as a Mark of Favour, that Prince, at his Departure, remitted him an Obligation for 300 Purfes, which had been exacted from him by the late Vizir Aly Pascha. On Monday last the Vizir entertained the Sultan at the Sweet-Waters: There were vast Preparations made, and all ended with the greatest Order. Our Advices from Cairo of the 17th of May mention, that a Skirmish had happen'd there amongst the leading Men, which ended with the Defeat of one Risvan Chezia, a Man of great Interest, and who aspir'd at Sovereign Power. This Fray had restored Quiet there, but how long it may last is difficult to judge, and whether Order and Regularity can ever be established. The independent State those Chiefs have been in for some Years, will undoubtedly engage them to oppose any Measures this Prince may take to render that Government more subservient to his Authority.

Leghorn,

Leghorn, Aug. 29. By our last Advices from Corsica, we learn, that M. Pasquali de Paole, seeing a Faction raised against him, by the Perfidiousness of some of his People, courageously opposed them; and was therein assisted by the Commons of the Nation, who elected him their Chief, and Director; and that, having assembled a Body of Seven Thousand Men, he defeated Matra, Chief of that Faction, who, in a little Time after, was quite abandoned by his Followers, and obliged to fly with the Remnant, about One Hundred Men, into a small Fort situated on the Shore of Alena, from whence, in a small Skiff, he sent his Wife and Family to Bastia, leaving his House and Effects at the Discretion of the Conquerors; which, however, they would not demolish, out of Regard to his Brother, a Lieutenant Colonel in the Service of the King of Sardinia. It is added, that Matra, in this Situation, implored Succours from the Genoese Commissaries, and that, in Consequence thereof, a Quantity of Flour, Powder, and Shot, had been sent him from Bastia. That M. de Paole had caused a General Pardon to be proclaimed in all the Parishes, to all such as had taken up Arms against him, excepting, nevertheless, fourteen Persons, amongst whom are Matra, Santucci and Son, Cotoni and Paganelli, who all, as Traytors and Rebels against their Country, were proscribed, and their Crimes declared Capital. Their Goods and Effects have been burnt or plunder'd, as also have been those of their Dependents, who refused the Benefit of the Proclamation. Those who accepted it, were exempted from any other Punishment, besides being sent Prisoners to the Castle of Corte. It is thought that M. de Paole will prosecute his March; and there is a Report, that he intends to attack Matra, with the Remains of his Faction, in the Fort of Alena.

Hamburg, Sept. 5. Baron Backof, the Danish Envoy at the Imperial Court, having obtained Leave of Absence for some Time from his Post, is arrived here from Vienna, on his Way to Denmark.

Turin, Sept. 6. Thursday the 4th Instant, the Count of Noailles, Ambassador Extraordinary from his most Christian Majesty to this Court, arrived here.

Copenhagen, Sept. 9. On the 7th Instant, about Eleven of the Clock at Night, died here, after a few Days Illness, his Excellency Werner Count Schulenburg, who was Privy Counsellor, Knight of the Order of the Elephant, Field Marshal and Secretary at War in the Service of the King of Denmark. Being far advanced in Years, he was quickly carried off by a Mortification, which begun, without any remarkable Accident, in one of his Feet.

Brussels, Sept. 16. We are informed, that in all Probability the French Troops will remain in their Cantonments till they begin to separate on the 20th Instant, on Account of the Badness

of the Ground in their Camp at Aimezie, which is now become a mere Morass: We likewise hear that six Battallions of those Troops are to be removed to the inward Parts of the Kingdom, from whence upwards of 30 Battallions are ordered to march into French Flanders, and upon the Maese, so as to make up the Number of 90 or 92 Battallions, by which the Troops in these Parts will be increased to above double their present Number, including the Augmentation of four Companies per Battallion and ten Men per Company. The Captains are already appointed, and actually employed in raising their Companies, which are all to be compleat against the Time of the Reviews in March. The Regiments of Horse are to be augmented with ten Men per Troop, as well as the Dragoons, which last are besides, to have four additional Troops in each Regiment. The whole Augmentation in the National Troops, it is computed, will amount to Sixty-five Thousand Men. Governor Luttelton, who was taken on board his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Blandford, by M. du Guay's Squadron, arrived here Yesterday on his Return to England. Count Colloredo and Marquis Paolucci arrived here together last Friday from Hanover.
