Leghorn, Aug. 29. By our fast Advices from Corfica, we learn, that M. Pafquali de Paole, seeing a Faction railed against him, by the Perfidioulness of fome of Lis People, couragioufly opposed them; and was therein affisted by the Commons of the Nation, who elected him their Chief, and Director; and that, having allembled a Body of Seven Thousand Men, he defeated Matra, Chief of that Faction, who, in a little Time after, was quite abandoned by his Followers, and obliged to fly with the Remnant, about One Hundred Meny into a small Fort fituated on the Shore of Alena, from whence, in a small Skiff, he sent his Wise and Family to Baftia, leaving his House and Effects at the Discretion of the Conquerors; which, however, they would not demolifh, out of Regard to his Brother, 2 Lieutenant Colonel in the Service of the King of Sardinia. It is added, that Matra, in this Situation, implored Succours from the Genoese Commissaries, and that. in Consequence thereof, a Quantity of Flour, Powder, and Shot, bad been sent him from Bassia. That M. de Paole had caused a General Pardon to be proclaimed in all the Parishes, to "H such as had taken up Arms against him, excepting, neverthelefs, fourteen Perfons, amongst whom are Matra, Santucci and Son, Cotoni and Paganelli, who all, as Traytors and Rebels against their Country, were proferibed, and their Crimes declared Capital. Their Goods and Effects have been burnt or plunder'd, as also have been those of their Dependents, who refused the Benefit of the Proclamation. Those who accepted it, were exempted from any other Punishment, besides being sent Prisoners to the Caffle of Corte. It is thought that M. de Paole will profecute his March; and there is a Report, that he intends to attack Matra, with the Remains of his Faction, in the Fort of Alena. Hamburgh, Sept. 5. Baron Backof, the Danish Envoy at the Imperial Court, having obtained Leave of Ablence for fome Time from his Post, is arrived here from Vienna, on his Way to Denmark. Turin, Sept. 6. Thursday the 4th Instant, the Count of Noailles, Ambaffador Extraordinary from his most Christian Majesty to this Court, arrived here. Copenbagen, Sept. 9. On the 7th Inflant, about Eleven of the Clock at Night, died here, after a few Days Illnefs, his Excellency Werner Count Schulenburg, who was Privy Counfellor, Knight of the Order of the Elephant, Field Marshal and Secretary at War in the Service of the King of Denmark. Being far advanced in Years, he was quickly carried off by a Mortification, which begun, without any remarkable Accident, in one of his Feet. Bru Jess, Sept. 16. We are informed, that in all Probability the French Troops will remain m their Camonments till they begin to feparate sa the 20th Inflant, on Account of the Badness

of the Ground in their Camp at Aimetie, which is now become "a mere Morah : We likewile hear that fix Battallions of those Troops are to be removed to the inward Parts of the Kingdom, from whence upwards of 30 Batallions-are ordered to march into French Flanders, and upon the Maese, so as to make up the Number of 90 or 92 Battallions, by which the Troops in these Parts will be increased to above double their prefent Number, including the Augmentation of four Companies per Battallion and ten Men per Company. The Captains are already appointed, and actually employed in raising their Companies, which are all to be compleat against the Time of the Reviews in March. The Regiments of Horfe are to be augmented with ten-Men per Troop, as well as the Diagoons, which last are besides, to have four additional Troops in each Regiment. The whole Augmentation in the National Troops, it is dontputed, will amount to Sixty-five Thousand Men. Governor Lyttelton, who was taken on board his Britannick Majefty's Ship the Blandford, by M. du Guay's Squadron, arrived here Yesterday on his Return to England, Count Colloredo and Marquis Paolucci arrived here together last Friday from Hanover.
