Yesterday his Majesty reviewed the Regiments that were assembled, by his Order, in the Neighbourhood of Tschirna, and this Night is expected in this City, where great Preparations are making for his Reception.

Vienna, Sept. 8. Yefterday his Highness the Duke of Modena was declared Veldt Marechal, and Colonel Proprietor of the Regiment of Horse late Czernini's.

Berlin, Sept. 9. The King is expected at Potzdam from Silefia, towards the latter End of this Week.

Dresden, Sept. 14. The Differences, with respect to Commerce, between this Court and that of Berlin, are not yet entirely made up. Count Vitzthuin being appointed his Polish Majesty's Minister to the Court of France, sets out this Day on his Journey to Paris.

Hague, Sept. 16. On Thursday last in the Evening her Royal Highness the Princess Governante arrived here from Soeftdyk, with the young Prince Stadtholder, and the Princess Caroline his Sifter. And the fame Night her Royal Highness received the Compliments of the Lords of the Regency, and feveral other Perfons of Diffinction, upon her fafe Arrival. Bruffels, Sept. 19. By Letters received this Morning from Mons, we are informed, that the French Troops returned into their Camp at Aimerie the Day before Yefterday. Prince San Severing arrived here the Day before Yesterday from Hanover. And Yesterday Count Colloredo went to Mons, where he purposes to review his Regiment, and then to proceed next Monday on his Return to England.
