Kensington, Sept. 25. This Day Prince Golitzin, Envoy Extraordinary from the Empress of Russia, had a private vate Audience of her Royal Highnels Princels Amelia: To which he was introduced by Charles Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

Naples, Aug. 26. His Sardinian Majefy and his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy are this Day return'd from viewing the Fortifications at Suza and at Exilles, where they had been fince last Wednesday. This Morning the young Prince of La Tour and Taxis died here after a few Days Illness. Hague, Sept. 18.
