Whereas John Byrn, of Whitehaven in the County of Cumberland, Carrman, was, upon the Twenty Ninth Day of August last, charged by Information of two credible Persons upon Oath by them subscribed, before Peter How, Esq; one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said County of Cumberland, with having been guilty, upon the Third Day of June last, of being, with divers other Persons, to the Number of four and upwards, armed with Fire Arms, or other offensive Weapons, and so armed being assembled near a Place called Saktom, in the County of Cumberland, in order to be aiding and assisting in the Running, Landing, and carrying away uncustomed Goods—Which Information was afterwards certified by the said Peter How, under his Hand and Seal, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the late Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, in that Case made and provided—His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, require and command, that the said John Byrn do surrender himself, within the Space of Forty Days after the First Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or one other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

*Kensington, Sept. 25.*

This Day Prince Golitzin, Envoy Extraordinary from the Empress of Russia, had a private

vate Audience of her Royal Highness Princess Amelia: To which he was introduced by Charles Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

*Constantinople, Aug. 16.* On the 14th Instant, his Excellency Mr. Porter, Ambassador from his Britannick Majesty, had an Audience of the Vizir, to deliver his said Majesty's Letters of Congratulation on the Sultan's Accession to the Throne, which were receiv'd by him with the highest Regard and the strongest Assurances of his Master's sincere Desire to cultivate and improve the Harmony subsisting between the two Courts. The same Day the Vizir Cheaia was depos'd; He was accus'd of Venality, in removing the Head Butcher, to put in another for Money. Zayd Efendi, formerly in France, who has been twice Cheaia, has succeeded him for the third Time. The Bostangi Bafchi has been also depos'd. M. Schwachheim, the Imperial Resident, having had his Audiences of the Grand Seignor and Vizir, and his Predecessor, Baron Benckler, that of Leave of the Vizir, he will depart for Vienna next Month.

*Naples, Aug. 26.* Yesterday an Express arrived at Court, dispatched by the Marquess de Fogliani, Viceroy of Sicily, with an Account, that the Slaves on board two of the King's Gallies, viz. the St. Anthony, commanded by Don Emanuel Sereno, and the St. January, commanded by the Marquess Michael Borgia, had rose upon their Officers and Guards, and after having massacred them, rowed off for the Coast of Barbary. Upon the Receipt of this News, Orders were immediately sent to the other Commanders of the King's Gallies, to take all necessary Precautions to prevent any Accident of this Kind happening for the Future.

*Stockholm, Sept. 5.* Count Sinzendorff, one of their Imperial Majesties Chamberlains, who arrived here lately from Petersbourg, is set out for Vienna, having taken his Route by Upsal and Gothenbourg, in order to see the new Canal of Trohalta. The usual Summonses are sent to all the Senators who are still in the Country, requiring their Attendance on Monday next, being the Day appointed for Opening their ordinary Assembly. The Baron d'Assebourg, who resided here for some Time in Quality of Minister from the King of Denmark, set out for Copenhagen on Saturday last, but 'tis imagined he will return here again before the Opening of the General Diet. The heavy Rains that have fallen in this Country for some Weeks past, have already raised the Price of Corn.

*Munich, Sept. 7.* On Wednesday last, being the Anniversary of the Birth of Cardinal Bavaria, Prince Bishop of Liege, and Uncle to

the Elector our Sovereign, all the august Family, who have been for some Time past at the Palace of Nymphenbourg, came to this City to celebrate the same, except the Empress Dowager, who being a little disposed, was obliged to be blooded the Night before.

*Berlin, Sept. 11.* Prince Henry, the King's Brother, has been ill for some Days past with a Fever, which prevented his accompanying his Majesty to Silesia.

*Venice, Sept. 12.* The Elector of Cologne, who arrived here on the 29th past, attended by his Master of the Horse, Chancellor, and several other Officers of State, was incog. under the Title of Count Werth, till he notified himself to the College on the 4th Instant. Two Savi Grandi and two Savi di Terra Ferma were then appointed to attend his Electoral Highness, who was entertained with different Feasts and Diversions for five or six Days afterwards; and this Day his Highness proceeded on his Journey to Rome. M. de Guebriant, the French Minister at the Elector's Court, travels with his Highness, but left this Place the 8th, to go to Parma, and is to join him at Bologna. Cardinal Banchieri, Legate of Ferrara, arrived here on the 10th Instant.

*Turin, Sept. 13.* His Sardinian Majesty and his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy are this Day return'd from viewing the Fortifications at Suza and at Exilles, where they had been since last Wednesday. This Morning the young Prince of La Tour and Taxis died here after a few Days Illness.

*Hague, Sept. 18.* We learn by the last Post from Germany, that M. van Til, Chief Magistrate of the Town of Pumerende, High Bailiff of the Districts of Beemster and Wyde-Wormer, formerly Minister from the States General to the Court of Lisbon, and who for some Years past was invested with the same Character to the Circle of Westphalia, died on Sunday last at Cologne, in the 58th Year of his Age; and that his Body was embalmed, in order to its being brought here and interred with his Ancestors.

*Brussels, Sept. 23.* The Accounts we have this Day from the French Camp at Aimerie, are, that the Dragoons were to quit it as Yesterday, two Regiments of Horse and two of Foot as this Day, and the Remainder of the Troops to Morrow and next Day. The Augmentation in the Foot and Dragoons is ordered to be completed against the Month of March, but the Horse have as yet received no Orders to recruit for that Purpose. The Troops that are to remain in French Flanders and along the Coast will amount to Sixty Thousand Men, including the Augmentation; and a large Body of Forces is likewise to be posted along the Coast of Brittany,

And to order the Letters to be conveyed three Days a Week (instead of two Days as at present) betwixt London and Aimesbury.

Also to quicken the Communication by Post, betwixt Sheffield and the great North Road, through Doncaster: And the Correspondence between Manchester, Liverpool, Warrington, Chester, Gloucester, South Wales, Brittol; and the whole Cross Road: As well as between Liverpool, Manchester, Wiggan, Preston, Lancaster, Kendal, and all Parts of Westmorland and Cumberland: And between Liverpool, and all Parts of Yorkshire, Durham, Northumberland, Scotland, Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire, Lincolnshire, Huntingdonshire, Cambridgeshire, and Norfolk.

Publick Notice is hereby given, that these several additional Conveyances, Improvements, and Regulations, will take Place from Friday the 10th Day of October next, being Michaelmas Day according to the Old Style.
