Kensington, October 1.

THIS Day the Count de Viri, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sardinia, had his first private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Amelia. To which he was introduced by Charles Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

Naples, Sept. 2. The Government has received an Account, by the Master of a French Ship, that the King's two Gallies, viz. the St. Anthony and St. January, that were seized and carried off from Trapani by the Slaves, after they had rose upon and massacred their Officers, have both reached Algiers.

Stockholm, Sept. 9. Their Majesties and the Royal Family are still at Drottningholm, but it is thought the whole Court will return here towards the End of the Month. The Marquis d'Havrincourt, Ambassador from France, who has been absent for some Time on his private Affairs, is returned to this Court. Baron Greiffenhein, our Minister to the General Diet of the Empire, having settled the Affairs for which he obtained Permission to come here, is preparing to return to Ratisbon.

Turin, Sept. 10. The King, accompanied by the Duke of Savoy, and several General Officers, is gone to Suze, in order to examine the Fortifications and Forts of that Place; from whence they will proceed to Alexandria de la Paglia for the same Purpose; and 'tis expected they will return here towards the Beginning of next Week. The Count of Noailles, who is shortly to have his Audiences of Leave, intends going to Parma, before he returns to his own Court.

Turin, Sept. 20. The Count of Noailles, Ambassador Extraordinary from his most Christian Majesty, had his Audiences of Leave this Morning of the whole Royal Family, and intends setting out on Monday for Parma.
