THE following Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin, having been transmitted by his Excellency the Marquess of Hartington, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, to the Right Honourable Sir Thomas Robinson, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been by him presented to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

BE pleased to accept from us, your most dutiful Subjects, a feint Expression of those Sentiments, which Loyalty and Gratitude inspire, on your safe Return to Great Britain.

Welcome! Royal Sir, to those Dominions where you reign in the Hearts of your People—Welcome! to that People, whose Happiness is, in a great Measure, derived from your Princely Care.

We cannot sufficiently admire your Majesty's unwearied Endeavours, for the effectual Support of the Honour of your Crown, and the Protection of all your Subjects; nor can we sufficiently revere that tender and diffusive Regard to your People, which will not suffer the Rights of the remotest American in the Colonies, to be invaded with Impunity.

No Monarch can be more anxious to continue to His Subjects the Blessings of Peace—None more ready to encounter all the Dangers of War, when Peace cannot otherwise be secured to them.

From you, Great Sir, Kings may learn to make their Subjects happy; and from us, those

Subjects may be taught to know, that their Lives and Fortunes ought at all Times to be devoted to the Interest and Honour of such a Prince.

In Testimony whereof, we have caused the Common Seal of the said City to be hereunto affixed, this Third Day of October, in the Year of our Lord, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty Five.

Constantinople, Sept. 1. On the 24th past the Vizir was suddenly depos'd and exil'd to Scio: He is succeeded by the Nissangi Paschi, late Selichtar Aga or Sword Bearer, who is in high Favour with the Sultan. He was no sooner invested with his new Dignity, than he immediately changed the Reis Esfendi, and sent him to Lemnos; however, that Exile has been since mitigated, by allowing him to frequent any Place except the City of Constantinople. Never was a greater Joy shewn, than on the Deposition of that Minister. His Successor is one Soparalan Achmet Esfendi, who has pass'd through several important Offices, particularly that of Testerdar or High Treasurer. There is Reason to think that the present Ministry will be durable. The Vizir is occupied in endeavouring to remedy the Scarcity of Provisions, by dispatching proper Orders to several Parts of the Empire for a Supply. His Excellency Mr. Porter, His Britannick Majesty's Ambassador, had his Audience of the Vizir Yesterday, to congratulate him on his Accession to that high Dignity; it pass'd with the greatest Civility, and the strongest Professions of the Sultan's Regard and Friendship for his Majesty. The Venetian and Dutch Ambassadors had their Audiences the same Day; the rest of the Foreign Ministers will immediately follow. Baron Benckler, the Imperial Minister, set out this Day on his Return to Vienna.

Naples, Sept. 16. His Britannick Majesty's Sloop the Speedwell, Capt. Webb, arrived here on Thursday last, and sailed again on Sunday in the Evening. On Friday the 12th Instant M. Pallavicini, the Pope's Nuncio, made his publick



publick Entry into this City; and this Morning he had also his publick Audience of their Sicilian Majesties. This Morning the two Dutch Men of War, with eight Merchant Ships under their Convoy, sailed for Malta, where they are to meet the Ships coming from the Levant, and take them also under their Convoy.

Dresden, Sept. 28. This Court sets out after To-morrow for Hubertsburgh and Leipzig: And it has been insinuated to the Foreign Ministers, that as his Polish Majesty did not intend to fix at Hubertsburgh, but would hunt at different Places, they might save themselves the Trouble of following him thither.

Hambourg, Sept. 30. His Danish Majesty's Envoy to the Court of England, M. de Rantzau, who has passed a few Weeks in Holstein upon his private Affairs, is set out from hence this Day, in order to return to his Post.

Hambourg, Oct. 3. Count Zintzendorff, who was sent this last Summer, on the Part of the Emperor and Empress-Queen, to compliment the Court of Russia upon the Birth of the young Prince, and had reached Hambourg on his Return to Vienna, has received Orders to go back to Petersbourg; where he is to reside in the Room of Count Esterhafi, who has obtained Leave to go to Carlsbad for the Recovery of his Health.

Brussels, Oct. 3. According to our last Advices from Dunkirk, the Works carrying on there were almost compleated; the last Battery was to be finished this Week. The Ingenieurs have been very busy in measuring and sounding the Harbour; and it was said that 800 Pioneers were expected there, in order, as was thought, to be employed in clearing it directly.

Hague, Oct. 3. The States of Holland will separate this Day or To-morrow Morning. Their Noble Mightinesses have come to no remarkable Resolutions in this Assembly, having only gone through the ordinary Business, and disposed of some vacant Employments. M. Buys is appointed Counsellor of the Court of Holland; and M. Mauritius, formerly Governor of Surinam, is appointed Minister at Hambourg, in the room of M. Buys. We are told here, that M. D'Affri, Major General and Lieutenant Colonel of the French Swiss Guards, is soon to set out from Paris for this Place, to execute an extraordinary Commission to their High Mightinesses. All the Advices from the Frontier confirm the March of the French Troops from their Camps into Quarters, and that every Thing is perfectly quiet in those Parts.

Whitehall, October 11, 1755.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, by the Commissioners for Managing His Majesty's Customs in that Part of His Majesty's Kingdom of Great-Britain called Scotland, That, in the Night of the 21st of July last, several Persons came on Board a Ship just

then arrived at Pittenweem, from Foreign Parts, and forced from the Deck into the Cabbin, four Tidemen, stationed in the said Ship, and there kept them close confined, till the Persons aforesaid had landed and carried off the entire Cargo thereof, and then set the said Ship adrift, which remained till Morning on the Rocks; and that the said Commissioners, upon receiving Notice of this outrageous Riot and Deserement, had offered, and published, a Reward of Fifty Pounds for the Discovery of any of the Persons concern'd; His Majesty, for the better discovering, and bringing to Justice, the Persons concerned in the said outrageous Riot and Deserement, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that they, or any one of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And to order the Letters, to be conveyed three Days a Week (instead of two Days as at present) betwixt London and Aimesbury.

Also to quicken the Communication by Post, betwixt Sheffield and the great North Road, through Doncaster: And the Correspondence between Manchester, Liverpool, Warrington, Chester, Gloucester, South Wales, Bristol, and the whole Cross Road: As well as between Liverpool, Manchester, Wigan, Preston, Lancaster, Kendal, and all Parts of Westmorland and Cumberland: And between Liverpool, and all Parts of Yorkshire, Durham, Northumberland, Scotland, Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire, Lincolnshire, Huntingdonshire, Cambridgeshire, and Norfolk.

Publick Notice is hereby given, that these several additional Conveyances, Improvements, and Regulations, will take Place from Friday the 10th Day of October next, being Michaelmas Day according to the Old Style.
