Whereas His Majesty hath thought proper to direct, that all the Reduced Officers of the Land Forces and Marines on the British Establishment of Half Pay, do forthwith transmit to this Office Their Age; The Country where they were born; The Dates and Ranks of the several Commissions they have had in the Army; The Quality and Corps, with the Time when they were placed upon Half Pay; And whether they came on by Reduction, Purchase, and from whom; Or by Exchange with whom, and from what Corps. His Majesty doth hereby require, that each of the said Reduced Officers do immediately send to this Office the several Particulars relating to himself, as above directed, on Pain of being omitted in the next Establishment of Half Pay.
