THE following Address of the Mayor, Sheriffs and Commonalty of the City of Corke, and of the Merchants, Traders, and other Inhabitants thereof, having been transmitted by his Excellency the Marquess of Hartington, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, to the Right Honourable Sir Thomas Robinson, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been by him presented to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Sheriffs and Commonalty of the City of Corke, and of the Merchants, Traders, and other Inhabitants thereof.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Sheriffs and Commonalty of the City of Corke, and the Merchants, Traders, and other Inhabitants thereof, most humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on your safe and happy Return to your British Dominions.

Most justly should we reproach ourselves, did we not take every Opportunity of expressing our sincere Gratitude for your Majesty's unwearied Vigilance in Protecting and Extending the Trade and Commerce of your People, and in Securing their True Interests and Liberties.

As we are fully convinced, that Peace and Tranquillity in these Kingdoms are the Consequences of your Majesty's glorious Administration; so are we truly sensible, that by the vigorous Measures taken by your Majesty, the same will again take Place in your Majesty's American Colonies, and the Rights and Possessions of the British Empire be effectually maintained; to the Support and Defence of

which, and of your Majesty's Sacred Person and Illustrious House, we shall most cheerfully devote our Lives and Fortunes on every Occasion. Given under the Common Seal of the said City, the 9th Day of October 1755.

Prague, Oct. 6. On Saturday last the Feast of St. Francis, whose Name the Emperor bears, was celebrated here in the usual Manner. On this Occasion Count Collowrath gave an elegant Dinner to great Numbers of the Nobility and Gentry, during which the Cannon were fired; and at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and Fireworks, in several Parts of the City. A great Quantity of Sabres, Swords and Bayonets have been brought here from Vienna within these few Days past, for the Use of the Imperial Troops quartered in this Kingdom.

Copenhagen, Oct. 8. We are informed that Count Sintzendorff, who stopt here for some Time on his Return from Russia, and afterwards continued his Journey for Vienna, has received Orders to return forthwith to Petersbourg, where his Presence was thought necessary on Account of the Indisposition of Count Esterhasi, Ambassador from their Imperial Majesties to that Court.

Dresden, Oct. 8. Yesterday being the King's Birth Day, there was a very numerous and brilliant Court at Hubertzbourg. The Princess of Weissenfelds is in a very declining State of Health; and M. Linau, who is charged with the Affairs of France at this Court, in the Absence of the Count de Broglie, has been very dangerously ill for some Days past.

Paris, Oct. 10. 'Tis now generally reported, that the Post of Colonel General of the Swiss and Grison Guards, vacant by the Death of the late Prince de Dombes, is intended for the Prince of Conti; and that the Government of Upper and Lower Languedock will be given to the Count de la Marche his Son. Publick Prayers are put up in all the Churches in this City,

City, by Order of our Archbishop, for the happy Delivery of the Dauphiness, who is near her Time. A few Days ago died here the Count de Lautrec, Lieutenant General of the King's Armies, in an Apoplectick Fit.

Hague, Oct. 16. The Prince of Hesse-Philipsthal, General of Horse in the Service of this Republick, and Governor of Tournay, has taken his Leave of her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and of the principal Members of the Regency, and purposes to set out To-morrow for his Government.
