*Kensington, November 2.*

**T**HIS Day Don Felix de Abreu and Bertodano, Knight of the Order of St. James, and Envoy Extraordinary from his Catholick Majesty, had a private Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales: To which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

*Carlton House, November 2.*

This Day Don Felix de Abreu and Bertodano, Knight of the Order of St. James, and Envoy Extraordinary from his Catholick Majesty, had a private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales: To which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

*Kensington, November 3.*

This Day Don Felix de Abreu and Bertodano, Knight of the Order of St. James, and Envoy Extraordinary from his Catholick Majesty, had a private Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke: To which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

*Constantinople, October 1.* On the 27th past we had one of the most dreadful Fires that has happen'd for many Years. It began at Twelve at Night, by the Water Side near the Seraglio, and burnt 34 Hours without Intermission, extending itself, by Means of a strong North East Wind, up the City towards the Mosques of Sancta Sophia and Sultan Achmet. All Efforts to stop its Fury were ineffectual. The Sultan on the 28th in the Evening abandon'd it to Providence to put an End to its Progress: The Porte, or Vizir's Palace, is burnt down; and most of the principal Ministers lost their Seraglio's. It has done immense Damage. What is the most affecting is, the Numbers of inferior People who have lost their whole Substance, without knowing which Way to turn for Subsistence. Its bad Effects will, we apprehend, be universally felt.

*Rome, Oct. 11.* On the 4th Instant, being the Emperor's Name-day, many Cardinals, Prelates, and Princes, who are Subjects and Feudatories of his Imperial Majesty, waited upon Cardinal Alexander Albani, to compliment him on that Occasion. On the 5th the Pope performed the Ceremony of making a

Daughter of the Great Constable Colonna a Nun. He was attended on this Occasion by his whole Court, with the greatest Pomp, having with him, in his State Coach, the Cardinals Millo and Argentyeillers: He went from the Quirinal to the Nunnery of Regina Coeli, where he was received by fifteen Cardinals; and, after having celebrated Mass in the Church, he entered into the Nunnery with the Cardinals, some Prelates, &c. and performed the Ceremony of investing the young Lady with the Habit of that Order; and afterwards admitted the Nuns to kiss his Foot. The next Day the new Nun presented Prince Lambertini, the Pope's Great Nephew, with a small Basket, in which was a Salad out of the Garden of her Convent; and, under it, six small Images richly embroidered, representing the Madonna, and a Knife, Fork, and Spoon, with a Cup and Saltfeller of Gold. The same Evening Cardinal Valenti returned to his Apartment at the Quirinal from Ronciglione. The Pope immediately, on his Return to the Palace from his Devotions, went to visit the Cardinal, and remained with him for some Time. On the 7th the Elector of Cologne, with three of his Gentlemen; having obtained an express Permission of the Pope, entered into the Nunnery of Regina Coeli, to make a Visit to the Constable Colonna's Daughter; and, on the 9th, his Electoral Highness set out for Albano, where he proposes to pass a few Weeks.

*Leipzig, Oct. 16.* Yesterday their Majesties, with the Princes Xavier and Charles, left this Place on their Return to Dresden. The Fair of this City is now ended, and 'tis generally thought did not answer so well to the Merchants as the Beginning of it seemed to promise. The King has caused an Edict to be published, setting forth, that as the Disputes with Prussia, on Account of Commerce, are like to be speedily adjusted, his Majesty thinks proper to abolish all new Taxes laid on Prussian Merchandize since the Commencement of those Disputes, and orders that, for the Future, those Taxes shall be reduced to their ancient Footing.

*Copenhagen, Oct. 17.* Last Night the King returned here from Jagersbourg, where his Majesty went last Monday to take the Diversion of Hunting. The two Men of War that carried the Presents from his Majesty to the Dey of Algiers, are returned from thence. And we are informed by their Officers, that when they left that Place, several new Ships were getting ready for a Cruise; but that, in general, the

People seemed to express a good deal of Uneasiness at the few Prizes that had been taken since their Declaration of War against the Imperialists and Dutch.

*Stockholm, Oct. 17.* On Tuesday last the Archbishop of Upsal was elected by the Clergy, Counsellor Kierman by the Burgesses, and the Sieur Hakanson by the Peasants, to be their respective Speakers at the next General Diet, which will be opened the Beginning of next Week in the Presence of the King; when the Articles, on which they are to deliberate, will be delivered to them in his Majesty's Name.

*Florence, Oct. 18.* Last Week the Chevalier de Sales, who lately resigned his Post of Lieutenant and Commandant, *pro interim*, of the Emperor's Life-Guards, called *La Garde Noble*, set out from hence, by Way of Atezzo, for Rome and Naples, to embark for Malta; on Notice whereof, Major Dumefnil, who, on Account of a Quarrel with him was dismissed from that Body, followed M. de Sales with an Intention to fight him. From Leghorn we are informed, that on the 12th Instant at Night they had a violent Storm of Thunder and Lightning, which beat down a large Building, and did other Damage. The same Storm was violent likewise at Florence, and in that Neighbourhood, but did no very great Harm. On the 15th Instant the Empress's Name-day was celebrated in the usual Manner. Count Richecourt (who the Day before returned to this City from the Country) was complimented on the Occasion by the Foreign Ministers, the Nobility; Strangers, and the Chiefs of the Military Officers, some of whom he entertained at Dinner; and, in the Evening, the usual Fireworks, and Cannon of the Castles, were fired.

*Berlin, Oct. 21.* The King has lately made some Military Promotions. The Princes Henry and Ferdinand, the King's Brothers, are gone to Rynsberg, where they propose to pass some Time. His Majesty has nominated Baron Goltz to meet, at Hall, the Saxon Commissaries appointed to adjust the Differences that have arisen between this Kingdom and that Electorate, in Regard to Commerce, in the Room of M. Schlaberndorff, lately appointed first Minister of the Department of Silesia.

*Hague, Oct. 28.* The Deputies of the several Colleges of the Admiralty of these Provinces, who are assembled here, are deliberating upon the Affairs of their Department. And To-morrow our Lords the States of this Province will open their Assembly, for which Purpose most of the Members are already arrived.

*Dublin, October 23.*

Yesterday being the Anniversary of His Majesty's Coronation, the Great Guns were fired in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks: At Noon there was a numerous Appearance of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant upon this Occasion: At Night there was a Play given by

his Excellency for the Entertainment of the Ladies, and a Ball at the Castle. And this Day being the Anniversary of the Irish Rebellion in 1641, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant proceeded in the usual State to Christ Church, attended by the House of Peers, Judges, &c. and escorted by a Squadron of Horse, where an excellent Sermon was preached by the Bishop of Ossory upon that Occasion. The Sword of State was carried to and from the Church by the Earl of Ross. After his Excellency's Return to the Castle, the Great Guns in his Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys of Small Arms from the Regiments of Foot on Duty, drawn out at the Royal Square at the Barracks: And the Evening concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
