St. James's, November 8.

THIS Day His Majesty, and the Royal Family, came from Kensington to St. James's for the Winter Season.

Kensington, November 6.

This Day Don Felix de Abreu and Bertodano, Knight of the Order of St. James, and Envoy Extraordinary from his Catholick Majesty, had a private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Amelia: To which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Petersbourg, Oct. 11. On the 11th of October, N. S. was celebrated at Court the first Anniversary of the Birth of the young Great Duke Paul Petrowitz, when all the Ambassadors, Russian Nobility, and Foreign Ministers, had the Honour to compliment her Imperial Majesty and their Imperial Highnesses the Great Duke and Great Dutchess upon the Occasion, during which Time the Cannon of the Citadel and the Admiralty were fired. In the Evening there was a Ball at Court; after which the Great Chancellor Bestoucheff, by Order of the Empress, invited them to come and see the young Great Duke in an adjacent Room; and who, soon after, was shewn to all the Court. The same Evening Prince Dolgorucki, who is appointed to go Ambassador from this Court to Constantinople, took his Leave of her Imperial Majesty; and the same Day the Lieutenants General Lieven and Farmer, likewise the Prince of Holstein-Beek, had the Honour to thank her Imperial Majesty, the first being declared General of Horse, and the two latter Generals of Foot. On the 8th Instant Count Esterhasi gave a great Feast in Honour of the Birth of the young Great Duke; at which her Imperial Majesty and their Imperial Highnesses, and the most distinguished Part of the Russian Nobility, assisted.

Dusseldorff, Oct. 15. The Court went Yesterday to Stambach, a Hunting-Seat of the Elector's in the Country of Juliers, to hunt for two Days, and will return hither the 17th. Prince Frederick of Deux Ponts sets out from Mannheim the 28th, to wait upon the Elector, and to assist at the Celebration of the Feast of St. Charles; after which it will be known whether the Court passes the Winter here, or returns to Mannheim.

Dresden, Oct. 15. The Letters Patent for Re-establishment of the Trade with Brandenburg, are to the following Effect. By the Grace of God, Frederick August, King of Poland, &c. Duke of Saxony, &c. Elector, &c. &c. Whereas we have agreed with his Prussian Majesty, in a friendly and neighbourly Manner, to enter into Treaty about the Differences which have arisen with regard to Commercial Affairs, and, in the mean Time, to abrogate all Prohibitions and Imposts issued out on both Sides since the Leipzik Easter Fair of the present Year, and to re-establish every Thing upon the same Footing as before the said Fair. In Pursuance of this our Agreement, it is our Pleasure, that the general Prohibitions issued in our Electoral and Hereditary Countries, with regard to the Prussian Commerce on the 27th of May, 7th of June, and 10th of July, shall be abrogated, as the same will be done on his Prussian Majesty's Side, with respect to his Prohibitions, and Things remain, from this Day till farther Order, in the Condition in which they were before the Leipzik Easter Fair of this Year. Therefore we order all our Vassals, Officers, Counsellors, and Magistrates, not only to observe themselves these our Commands, but also to make them known immediately to every one, especially to those Merchants, Manufacturers, and Tradesmen, who negotiate and traffick in the Prussian Countries, &c. Dresden, Oct. 19. On Thursday the 16th Instant, early in the Morning, died at Leipzik Count Bruhl, his Polish Majesty's Master of the Horse, and elder Brother to the Minister, aged about Sixty. As he was of the Teutonick Order, and consequently could not marry, his two Brothers are to be his Heirs. Several Thieves and Highwaymen have been detected and seized within these two Years past, and some of them lately executed in different Places of this Electorate.

Dresden, Oct. 22. Yesterday in the Morning the Corps of the deceased Count Bruhl was brought and interred here in the Church of the Virgin Mary. He is generally very much regretted, but especially by the Protestants; to whose Church he was very zealously devoted, and a strenuous Opposer of all Attempts of the Papists to their Prejudice. His Polish Majesty has conferred the Place of Master of the Horse on M. de Weelen, one of his Majesty's Chamberlains.

Brussels, Oct. 31. His Royal Highness Prince Charles of Lorraine is expected in Town this Day, from his Hunting-Seat at Mariemont, in the Province of Haynault.
