To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Principal, Professors, and Masters of the University of Aberdeen.

*May it please your Majesty,*

**W**E, the Principal, Professors, and Masters of an University under your Majesty's immediate Patronage, from a deep Sense of the Happiness we enjoy under a mild and legal Government, humbly beg Leave to approach your Royal Presence with the sincerest Expressions of Duty and Gratitude.

We have observed, thro' your Majesty's auspicious Reign, the Laws permitted to take their due Course—We have seen Property protected, Piety and Learning promoted, Industry rewarded, and every Thing encouraged that tends to the Prosperity and Honour of the Nation: But now, when the public Tranquillity seems to be in Suspence, thro' the Ambition of a restless Power, always ready to foment Com-motions—when, after many Encroachments, your Majesty's Colonies are openly invaded, and Europe is threatened with new Confusions,—permit us, most cordially to renew our Protestations of inviolate Attachment to our Royal Patron, and to the Protestant Succession in his August Family.

Also to quicken the Communication by Post, betwixt Sheffield and the great North Road, through Doncaster: And the Correspondence between Manchester, Liverpool, Warrington, Chester, Gloucester, South Wales, Bristol, and the whole Cross Road: As well as betwixt Liverpool; Manchester, Wigan, Preston, Lancaster, Kendal, and all Parts of Westmorland and Cumberland: And between Liverpool, and all Parts of Yorkshire, Durham, Northumberland, Scotland, Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire, Lincolnshire, Huntingdonshire, Cambridgeshire, and Norfolk.

Publick Notice is hereby given, that these several additional Conveyances, Improvements, and Regulations, will take Place from Friday the 10th Day of October next, being Michaelmas Day according to the Old Style.
