GEORGE R. WHEREAS We did, by Our Royal Proclamation of the Twentieth Day of ' October last, prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder for the Space of Three Months from the Date thereof, without Our Licence in that Behalf fiist obtained, excepting only such Gunpowder as flould be exported by the Direction · of the Principal Officers of Our Board of Ord-• nance, for Our Service : And whereas We have judged it necessary, for the Publick Good, to continue the faid Prohibition for fome longer Time: We do therefore, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby ftrictly Charge, Prohibit, and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever, except the Officers of Our faid Board of Ordnance for Our Service, do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Expiration of the aforementioned Term of Three Months, prefume to Transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Gunpowder, or ship or lade any Gunpowder on Board any Ship or Veffel, in order to Transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Licence or Permillion in that Behalf first obtained from Us, of Qur Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and fuffering the greatest Punishments and For-

Whereas by His Majesty's Proclamations bearing Date the Eleventh Day of November ' last, "For recalling and prohibiting Seamen " from ferving Foreign Princes and States; for " giving Encouragement to Seamen and Able-" bodied Landmen, to enter themfelves on Board "His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting " Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall " conceal themselves; and also for taking up all " Straggling Seamen ;" His Majefty was gracioully pleased to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Three Pounds, for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings for every Ablebodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fhould be paid to every fuch Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirty first Day of this Instant December, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majefty's Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by the faid Proclamation; as likewife that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person who should, on or before the faid Thirty first Day of this Instant, difcover any Seaman, or Seamen, who should conceal themselves, so that such Seaman, or Seamen, should be taken for His Majesty's Service: And whereas the Time limited for paying the faid Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring; and it being judged expedient for His Majelty's Service, that the fame fhould be continued for fome longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the Time limited by the faid Proclamation, for Payment of the faid Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the faid Thirty First Day of this Inftant December, to the Thirty First Day of January next inclusive. And that the faid respective Bounties and Rewards be continued to be paid by the Persons, and at the Times, directed by His Majesty's aforesaid Pro-W. Sharpe. clamation.
