The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by His Majesty's Proclamation, bearing Date the Eleventh Day of November last, "For recalling and prohibiting Seamen "from serving Foreign Princes and States; for "giving Encouragement to Seamen and Able-bodied Landmen, to enter themselves on Board "His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting "Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall "conceal themselves; and also for taking up all "Straggling Seamen;" His Majesty was graciously pleased to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, should be paid to every such Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirty first Day of this Instant December, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by the said Proclamation; as likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person who should, on or before the said Thirty first Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman, or Seamen, who should conceal themselves, so that such Seaman, or Seamen, should be taken for His Majesty's Service: And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the

Time limited by the said Proclamation, for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty First Day of this Instant December, to the Thirty First Day of January next inclusive. And that the said respective Bounties and Rewards be continued to be paid by the Persons, and at the Times, directed by His Majesty's aforesaid Proclamation.

Constantinople, November 15. Our new Ministry seem to govern hitherto to the general Content and Satisfaction, the rigorous Punishment of the late Vizir, for Mal-Administration, making every one act with great Circumspection; for, as this Prince is a Lover of Justice, he is determined to see it administered by his Ministers. The Sums of Money belonging to the late Vizir, accumulated by Rapine and Venality, are said to amount to 7800 Purfes, or 3,900,000 Dollars, and it is thought much is still secreted, which they are endeavouring to find out. The Testerdar or High Treasurer has been deposed, and is succeeded by the next in Order. This Day his Excellency Mr. Porter had his Audience of the new Vizir Zayde Esendi, to congratulate him on his Accession to that high Post; it passed with the greatest Cordiality and Assurances of the Sultan's Desire to preserve and cultivate His Majesty's Friendship. The rest of the Foreign Ministers are preparing to follow.

Rome, Dec. 6. Orders are given for equipping the Pope's Gallies, and his two Frigates of War. The Pope's Frigate St. Paul is returned to Civita Vecchia, having carried into that Port the Barbary Corsair Pink, which she took a few Weeks ago. On the 30th past the Jesuits held a Chapter of their Order with the usual Formalities, in which the Pere Centurione, a Genoese Nobleman, (their late Vicar General) was unanimously chosen General of their Order, and in the Afternoon he had an Audience of the Pope, who received him with Marks of Affection, and expressed great Satisfaction for his Election.

Florence, Dec. 13. On the 5th Instant a Notification from the Council of Finances was published in the different Cities of Tuscany, to reduce the Value of a small Silver Roman Species of Half and Quarter of Pauls that have been current since the Year 1740. The Emperor has promoted Count de la Tour, Son-in-Law to Count Richécourt, to be Lieutenant of his Body Guard, called La Garde Noble, with the Rank of Colonel. By the last Post from Milan, Notice was sent hither of the Decease, on the 30th past, of M. Biglia, the Pope's Nuncio at Florence. On the 8th, being the Emperor's Birth Day, the same was celebrated here with the usual Solemnity: Count Richécourt was complimented on the Occasion by the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and the Chief of the Military Officers, many of whom he entertained at Dinner; and in the Evening the usual Fireworks, and the Cannon of the Castles were fired.

Munich, Dec. 23. The Elector of Cologne, who returned lately to this Court from Italy, set out Yesterday for Mergentheim, the principal Seat of the Teutonic Order, of which he is Grand Master, and from whence that Prince will repair in a few Days to his usual Residence at Bonn. M. de Guebriant, the French Minister, who attended his Electoral Highness in his Journey to Italy, and returned with him to Munich, set out at the same Time for Paris.
