P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty
in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 18th of December last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 31st Day of this Instant January— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer: — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 29th Day of February next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said 29th Day of February next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

This Day M. Michell, charg'd with the Affairs of the King of Prussia, had his first Private Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke.

And afterwards Signior Celestia, Minister from Genoa, had his first Private Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke.

To which they were both introduc'd by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Constantinople, Dec. 17. On the 5th Instant the Sultan, accompanied by the great Officers of State, and the whole Body of the Law, went in Procession from the Seraglio, to consecrate the new Mosch founded by his late Brother, which exceeds greatly in Workmanship those built by his Predecessors. It is named the Splendor of Sultan Osman, as being completed by him. Several rich Furrs were distributed by the Grand Signior on this Occasion to the principal Ministers. The Head of one Cara Osman Oglu was brought to the Porte on the 13th Instant. This Man, who resided in the Neighbourhood of Smyrna, was grown so powerful, that he had, it is said, 6000 Men at his Command, which it is conjectured gave Umbrage to the Grand Signior, as a Capigilar Cheaizy was sent thither to destroy him, which was effected by Stratagem: The Head was exposed here but a short Time on Account of his being a Janizary.

Naples, Jan. 6. On Wednesday last, about Two o'Clock in the Afternoon, the Queen was safely delivered of a Prince, who was immediately christened, and invested by the King with the Order of St. Januarius. Upon this News coming to Naples, there was a general Firing of all the Cannon of the Castles; and Orders were given for three Days Rejoycings throughout the City on this happy Occasion.

Dresden, Jan. 18. A Silver Mine has been discovered in a Mountain of this Country, not far from a place called Tschope, from which a Bohemian Gentleman has engaged to bring into his Polish Majesty's Treasury the Sum of 300,000 Dollars a Year, out of which he is to be allowed Four per Cent. The young Prince, of whom the Electoral Princess was delivered on the 27th past, has been baptized by the Name of Anthony, the Princes Xavier and Charles, and the Princess Christine, standing Godfathers and Godmother, as Proxies for the Elector of Cologne, the Bishop of Liege, and the Dutchess Dowager of Courland.

Hamburg, Jan. 23. Three of the four Ships which the Admiralty of Hamburg are sending



to Portugal, loaded chiefly with Timber and other Materials for the Construction of Houses, are already fallen down the Elbe, but are detained at Cuxhaven by contrary Winds. The fourth Frigate is getting ready with all possible Diligence. It blew a violent Storm here last Tuesday Evening at full West, which continued till the next Morning; and though the Waters rose to a great Height in the lower Parts of this City, they did no considerable Damage.

Brussels, Jan. 27. Our Letters from the Frontiers mention, that the French Troops in the Interior Parts of the Kingdom are every where in Motion, and drawing near the Coasts of the Ocean between Brest and Dunkirk. They add, that Orders have been lately given to the Magistrates and Commanding Officers, all along the Frontiers, to be very careful in examining and taking a particular Account of all Travellers passing to and fro. The Prince of Soubise is daily expected at Dunkirk, where a House is preparing for his Reception.

Also to quicken the Communication by Post, betwixt Sheffield and the great North Road, through Doncaster: And the Correspondence between Manchester, Liverpool, Warrington, Chester, Gloucester, South Wales, Bristol, and the whole Cross Road: As well as between Liverpool, Manchester, Wigan, Preston, Lancaster, Kendal, and all Parts of Westmorland and Cumberland: And between Liverpool and all

Parts of Yorkshire, Durham, Northumberland, Scotland, Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire, Lincolnshire, Huntingdonshire, Cambridge-shire, and Norfolk.

Public Notice is hereby given, that these several additional Conveyances, Improvements, and Regulations, will take Place from Friday the 10th Day of October next, being Michaelmas Day according to the Old Style.

And whereas great Numbers of Letters have hitherto been privately collected and delivered, as well in these as in other Parts of the Kingdom, contrary to Law, to the great Prejudice of the Revenue of the Post Office, Notice is likewise hereby given, that all Carriers, Coachmen, Watermen, Wherry-men, Dispersers of Country News Papers, and all other Persons whatsoever, hereafter detected in the illegal collecting, conveying, or delivering of Letters, will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity.
