The KING's most Excellent Majesty
in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 18th of December last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 31st Day of this Instant January— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer: — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 29th Day of February next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said 29th Day of February next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Naples, Jan. 10. Certain Advice having been received at Court, that the Plague is ceased at Albany, the King has throught proper to re-

voke the Order given some Time since by his Majesty, for obliging all Ships coming from those Parts to perform their Quarantine. Last Week Mount Vesuvius threw out a vast Quantity of inflammable Matter, but it has since entirely ceased.

Stockholm, Jan. 13. The Orders lately issued for establishing Magazines of Corn in the different Cities and Towns throughout this Kingdom, in order to supply the Poor therewith at a reasonable Price in Times of Scarcity, are already carrying into Execution in the Province of Upland.

Lisbon, Jan. 14. A few Days ago arrived here a Merchant Ship, with a Cargo of Corn, being Part of the Provisions, &c. &c. sent by the King of Great Britain for the Relief of the distressed Sufferers at this Place. When Mr. Castres delivered his Britannick Majesty's Letter of Condolance, and acquainted their most Faithful Majesties with the Supplies immediately ordered from England, they expressed the deep Impression such humane and generous Acts of Friendship made upon them. The rest of the Royal Family, the Portuguese Ministers, and indeed all Ranks of People, are full of the most sincere Acknowledgments for the compassionate Concern and Munificence of the British Nation, upon this melancholy Occasion. Most of the considerable Diamonds belonging to the Royal Family, besides a large Quantity of melted Plate, have been found in the Ruins of the Palace. Several Days have passed free from any Shocks of the Earthquake, or only such small ones, as have been hardly perceptible; and as they have gone off gradually, it is hoped they are all over. The Fernambuco Fleet set Sail on the 2d Instant; and those for the Rio de Janeiro, and the Bahia, will do the same at the Times appointed.

Cologne, Jan. 27. Yesterday a smart Shock of an Earthquake was felt in this City, which happily went off without doing any Damage.

Hague, Jan. 29. They write from Zealand, that the Admiralty of that Province has put the Veer, a 50 Gun Ship, into Commission, and given the Command thereof to Captain Stavoninus; and Captain Vis has got the Command of a 20 Gun Ship, also put in Commission at the same Time.

Brussels, Jan. 30. We are informed from Dunkirk, that on the 27th Instant, all the English Vessels at that Place were stop'd, and their Crews (amounting to about 50 Men) sent to Prison. The Vessels seized, are two Colliers, two Sloops, one London Trader, and four Cutters. We don't yet hear however, that War has been declared by the Court of France. All our Advices from the Frontiers agree, that Troops are marching from all Parts towards the Coast of Normandy; and that Orders have been issued for compleating the Militia all over the Kingdom, and for augmenting the same from 500 to 590 Men per Battalion. The Empress Queen has granted Letters Patent, bearing Date the 7th Instant, for the Erection of a new Lottery in the Low Countries, for raising the Sum of Four Millions of Florins Exchange Money, amounting to about Four Hundred Thousand Pounds Sterling. This Lottery is to consist of Twenty Thousand Tickets at Two Hundred Florins each, and to be divided into Ten Classes, the first of which (consisting of 2000 Tickets) is to be drawn the 15th of May next ensuing, and the same Number of Tickets every Year, till the whole is drawn; each Ticket undrawn bearing an Interest of Four per Cent. Her Majesty, to secure the Payment of this Money, engages the Revenues, not only of the Low Countries, but also of her hereditary Dominions in Germany.

Brussels, Feb. 4. Sixteen Battalions from different French Garrisons upon our Frontiers, are ordered to march directly towards the Coasts of Normandy, where, it is said, a considerable Body of Troops, and a large Train of Artillery, are to be assembled near Havre de Grace. Other Advices from several Parts of France agree, that all the Troops, that were in the interior Provinces, are moving towards the Coasts of Normandy and Brittany.

Publick Notice is hereby given, that these several additional Conveyances, Improvements, and Regulations, will take Place from Friday the 10th Day of October next, being Michaelmas Day according to the Old Style.

And whereas great Numbers of Letters have hitherto been privately collected and deliver'd, as well in these as in other Parts of the Kingdom, contrary to Law, to the great Prejudice of the Revenue of the Post Office, Notice is likewise hereby given, that all Carriers, Coachmen, Watermen, Wherry-men, Dispersers of Country News Papers, and all other Persons whatsoever, hereafter detected in the illegal collecting, conveying or deliver'ing of Letters, will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity.
