PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHerezs the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 18th of December last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and alfo to all Able-bodied Landmen, who fhould voluntarily enter themfelves in His Majesty's Royal Navy ; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Perfons discovering Seamen who fhould conceal themfelves, will expire upon the 31st Day of this Instant January-And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid Time longer : - His Majefty fome for doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy. Council, hereby Order, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 29th Day of February next, enter themfelves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majefty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewife that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Perfons who fhall, on or before the faid 29th Day of February next, discover any Sea-man or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, fo as fuch Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majefty's Service. Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly. W. Sharpe.

Hague, Feb. 10. Her Royal Highness the Princels Governance has disposed of the Swifs Regiment, vacant by the Death of Lieutenant General Rebeque, in Favour of Major General Sturler; and Lieutenant Colonel Bouequet has got the Command of the Regiment commanded by Major General Sturler.

HERE having been various and injurious R2ports relating to the State of the French Sai-lors detained in England, it is thought proper, to remove any Prejudice that may be entertained, to give the following Account of their Treatment.

Upon general Orders being given to feize French Ships, the Numbers immediately brought into our Ports were fo great, that for want of proper Places to confine the Man afhore, they were put on board His Majefly's Ships in Harbour, where they were victualled in every Respect as the English Seamen, till Places proper for their Security and Accomoda-tion could be provided on Land, when they were victualled in the same Manner as during the late War with France, each Perfon being allowed for every Seven Days the following Proportion and Spe-cies of Provisions, viz.

Bread, Ten Pounds and Half. Beef, Four Pounds and Half. Beer, Seven Quarts. Cheefe, Six Ounces.

Peale, One Quart. An Account of which Allowance was fixed in every Place, that each Perfon might know what he was

to have. The Officers were permitted to refide in fome of the Towns adjacent to Portfmouth and Plymouth, where those belonging to the French King were allowed One Shilling, and the others Six Pence per

When any of those Sailors were Sick, they were When any of thole Sallors were Sick, they were removed to the Holpitals and Quarters, and taken Care of by Phyficians, Surgeons and Nurfes, fup-plied with Bedding, Medicines, and proper Diet, and treated in every Respect as the fick Seamen be-longing to His Majesty's Fieet. Notwithflanding this Precaution many of them

have died, which may be attributed to their being come from Foreign Voyages before their Confinement, by which they have contracted Scorbutick and other Diforders, but neither Pains or Expence have been spared in providing for them, and every Thing possible hath been done for Persons in their unfortunate Condition, nor upon the strictest Enquiry has it been found that the Orders given in their Regard have been difobeyed.
