much pitted with the Small Pox, of a brownifh Complexion, about Nineteen Years old, the' he appears to be about Twenty fix, Left Handed, his right Hand lamifh, wore his own fhort curled Hair, of a lightifh Brown, was born at Bagfhot in Surry, had on when he made his Efcape a whitifh coloured Surtcat Coat, with two Patches near the Waift behind, two Waftcoats, one red and white Cherry, Derry, with wrought Brofs Buttons, the other Linnen, dirty Leather Breeches, black rib'd Stockings, White Metal Bucklis, and a tolerable good Hos flaped, wore a Neckcloth, and bad brown Fuftian Sleeves with two red Worfted Buttons. He had in his Pocket, fealed in a Piece of Paper, the Will and Power of Thomas Kiske, Felonging to the Ramillies Man of War; dated in March 1755.
