The KING's most Excellent Majesty
in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 27th of January last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant February— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer: — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of March next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of March next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Naples, February 3. The Queen went Yesterday to Church, and appeared in Publick for the first Time since her Lying-in. There was a great Court at Caserta on this Occasion. Some Days ago the Prince's Regiment of Dragoons, commanded by Don Antonio Spinelli, was embarked, and sailed for Sicily, but has been drove back by contrary Winds.

Turin, Feb. 7. Her Royal Highness the Dutchess of Savoy continues to be in a good Way, and the young Princess is perfectly well. The Marquis de Soragnia, Gentleman of the Bed-chamber to the Infant Duke of Parma, pass'd through this City the Beginning of the Week on his Return from Versailles, where he had been to pay a Compliment to his most Christian Majesty, on the Birth of the Comte de Provence, from their Royal Highnesses the Infant and the Infanta.

Madrid, Feb. 9. The Reports of a private Treaty being on the Tapis between this Court and that of Versailles, for securing the Possessions of both Nations in Europe and America, are entirely without Foundation. Their Catholick Majesties continue in perfect Health at the Palace de Buen Retiro. Letters from Malaga of the 3d Instant say, that four large French Merchant Ships, of 20 Guns and 50 Men each, had put into that Harbour in their Ballast, bound from Marseilles to St. Malo. Those from Barcelona of the 31st past, mention a Report spread there, that 12 Ships of the Line, and six Frigates were ready to put to Sea at Toulon.

Cologne, Feb. 18. This Morning at Eight o'Clock we had a very smart Shock of an Earthquake, that lasted above 20 Seconds; it threw down several Chimneys and Part of the Prison Walls; we felt a lesser about Nine. These Shocks have greatly alarmed the whole Town. The Elector of Cologne quits Dusseldorf To-morrow Morning and lies at Brühl, and the next Day his Electoral Highness returns to Bonne. The States of Osnabruck have agreed to present his Electoral Highness with a Free Gift of a Hundred Thousand Crowns. The States of Munster have not complied with

the

the Elector's Orders for augmenting the Troops of that Bishoprick.

Brussels, Feb. 20. Our Advices from the Frontiers import, that the French Militia had begun to enter the fortified Towns, and that there were already some arrived at Conde, at Landrecies, and at Avesnes, in order to relieve the Regiments of Eu, Conti and Condé, which are to march towards the Coasts of Normandy and Brittany about the 5th of next Month, as was currently reported. The Regiments of Picardie, Lionnois, Royal Suédois, La Tour du Pin, and Beauvoisis are likewise order'd to hold themselves in Readiness to march between the 15th and 25th of March, and are to be stationed along the Coast from Dunkirk to Boulogne, where it is said a Camp is intended to be formed. According to our Letters from Dunkirk, the Prince of Soubise, and other General Officers, (who have been daily expected there for some Time,) were not arrived the Day before Yesterday. On Wednesday Morning a little before Eight o'Clock, we were alarmed here with a Shock of an Earthquake, which continued about a Minute; but providentially did no other Damage than throwing down a few Chimneys. It was followed by two other Shocks less violent, The same was felt more or less in the Neighbouring Towns; but we don't hear of any considerable Mischief. Another Shock was felt again this Morning about Four o'Clock.

Brussels, Feb. 24. We are informed that the French Troops upon our Frontiers, continue to remain very quiet in their Garrisons; but that those from the Interior Parts of the Kingdom are in full March towards the Coasts of Normandy and Brittany. The French Court has published an Ordonnance, by which all their Officers, except those of the Cavalry, are enjoined to return to their respective Corps by the 1st of April, without waiting to compleat their Companies. The Officers of the Cavalry are allowed to remain absent till the Expiration of their Furlows: And the Time for compleating the last Augmentation in the French Infantry, which was fixed for the 1st of March, is prolonged to the 1st of April.
