AT the Court at St. James's the 28th Day of February 1756,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 27th of January last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant February— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer: — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of March next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of March next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

THE Mayor, Aldermen, Burgesses and Inhabitants of your Majesty's Ancient and Loyal Corporation of the Town and County of Poole, being duly sensible of the invaluable Privileges and great Happiness we enjoy under your Majesty's auspicious Reign; and how intimately connected our present Prosperity is, with the Continuance of your Majesty's precious Life, and the Succession of your Royal House; being deeply affected with the Apprehension of any Dangers that may interrupt that Series of National Happiness we enjoy under your Majesty's mild and equal Reign over us; and having in the utmost Detestation the insolent Menaces, the most iniquitous Encroachments of the French King, in Violation of all National Faith, and most Solemn Treaties, by invading and violently taking Possession of any Part of your Majesty's Empire in America or Europe; humbly beg Leave to assure your Majesty of our inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person and Government; and that we are determined, at the Expence of our Lives and Fortunes, to support and defend the same; being, with the greatest Duty, and warmest Affections,

Publick Notice is hereby given, that these several additional Conveyances, Improvements, and Regulations, will take Place from Friday the 10th Day of October next, being Michaelmas Day according to the Old Style.
