Westminster, March 9.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Honourable Sir Henry Bellenden, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting to His Majesty the Sum of Two Millions, to be raised by Way of Annuities, and a Lottery, charged on the Sinking Fund, redeemable by Parliament, and for extending to Ireland the Laws made in this Kingdom against private and unlawful Lotteries.

An Act for the speedy and effectual Recruiting of His Majesty's Land Forces and Marines.

An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Marine Forces while on Shore.

An Act to enable His Majesty to grant Commissions to a certain Number of Foreign Protestants, who have served Abroad as Officers or Engineers, to act and rank as Officers or Engineers in America only, under certain Restrictions and Qualifications.

An Act to repeal a Clause in an Act made in the Twenty-sixth Year of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to oblige Ships more effectually to perform their Quarantine; and for the better preventing the Plague being brought from Foreign Parts into Great Britain or Ireland, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man; whereby the Stationing of Ships infected with the Plague, to the Northward of Cape Finisterre, is confined to the Harbour of New Grimsby, and removeable to no other Place, and for appointing a more safe and commodious Place instead thereof.

An Act for making and widening a Road from the East Side of the Parish of St. Mathew Bethnall Green, in the County of Middlesex, to the East End of Church-street in the said Parish, and to open a Way or Road into Shoreditch, and keeping the same in Repair.

An Act for repairing and widening the High Roads from Basingstoke, through Popham-Lane, Satton Scotney, and Stockbridge, in the County of Southampton, to a Place called Lobcomb Corner in the County of Wilts; and also for repairing and widening the Road from Spittlehouse, over Weyhill, to Mullen's Pond in the said County of Southampton.

An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for amending several Roads leading from the City of Exeter.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads leading from a Pond belonging to Henry Eyre, Esq; in the Parish of White Parish, in the Coun-

ty of Wilts, to the Top of Dunwood Hill, and from thence over Great Bridge and Middle Bridge, through Romsey-Infra, to Hundred Bridge, in the County of Southampton, and from thence to the County of Southampton.

An Act to enable the Trustees for repairing Old-street Road, to repair, widen, and make a Road, from the Sign of the Red Lyon on Windmill Hill, through Worship-street, to the Ditch Side next the East Side of Holy Well Mount, and through a certain Ground, to the Sign of the London Apprentice, in the Parishes of St. Luke and St. Leonard Shoreditch, in the County of Middlesex; or to lay open, repair and widen a Road from the said Red Lyon, through the Dog Bar, into the Old-street Road, in the said County.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the Eighteen Mile Stone beyond Willoughby Hedge, through the Town of Mere, in the County of Wilts, and through Wincanton, to Charlton Houthorn, and from thence to Milbourn Port, and from Willoughby Hedge aforesaid, to the West End of Long Lane in Kilmington; and from Wincanton aforesaid, to the Sherborn Turnpike Cross Gate on Cattle Hill, and from Wincanton to Sparkford, in the County of Somerset.

An Act for repairing and widening several Roads leading from and near the Town of Brewton, in the County of Somerset.

An Act for repairing and widening the several Roads from the Town of Tewksbury to Coscomb Gate, and from Isabel's Elm to the Top of Gotherington Hill, in the County of Gloucester, and from Tewksbury to a Farm House called the Old Blue Bell, and to the Direction Post in the Parish of Ripple, and to Simmond's Ford Brook, and from Breedon to Eckington Bridge in the County of Worcester; and from Tewksbury to Wainload's Bridge, and to the Road opposite to Elstone Church, and from the Market House in Cheltenham, to the Turnpike Road from Burford to Gloucester, near a Tree called Pewsdon-ash, in the said County of Gloucester.

An Act for repairing and widening several Roads leading from a Gate called Poole Gate, in the Town and County of Poole.

An Act for amending and keeping in Repair the Roads leading from Mead Brook, which divides the Parishes of Pucklechurch and Mangotsfield, in the County of Gloucester, to Christian Malford Bridge in the County of Wilts; and also from Pucklechurch aforesaid, to certain Coal Mines in the said Parish.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the Top of Harbham Hill, near the City of New Sarum, in the County of Wilts, through the Towns of Blandford Forum and Dorchester, to a certain Intrenchment on Askerwell Hill in the County of Dorset.

An Act to explain, amend, and render more effectual, an Act, made in the last Session of Parliament,



liament, intituled, *An Act for establishing, maintaining, and well-governing, a nightly Watch, within the City of Bristol.*

An Act for the better regulating the nightly Watch and Beadles, and Cleansing, Enlightening, and Paving, the Streets, Squares, Lanes, and other Passages, and repairing the Highways and Causeways, and regulating the Poor, within the Parish of St. Mary le Bone, in the County of Middlesex.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the Twenty second Year of His present Majesty, for repairing, enlarging and preserving the Harbour of Ellenfoot in the County of Cumberland.

An Act for rebuilding the Common Gaol for the County of Derby, upon a Place called Nuns Green, in the Liberty of the Town of Derby, and for appointing a proper Place for the safe Custody of Prisoners till such New Gaol shall be compleated, and to impower the Justices of the Peace for the said County, to pay the Rent reserved to the Corporation for the said Ground, out of the County Rates.

An Act for establishing a Fund for payment of the Bonds of the Governor, Bailiffs, and Commonality of the Company of Conservators of the Great Level of the Fens called Bedford Level, and for exchanging the present Bonds of the said Corporation, for other Bonds payable out of the Revenues of the Middle and South Levels, Part of the said Great Level, and for enabling the said Corporation to borrow further Sums for the Use of the said Great Level.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 27th of January last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant February— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer:— His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of March next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to

any Persons who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of March next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly. *W. Sharpe.*

Madrid, February 24. On the 10th Instant, his Catholick Majesty's Ships the *Hermiona* and the *Aguila*, arrived at Cadiz from Vera Cruz and the Havana with about five hundred and fifty thousand hard Dollars in Money, two thousand two hundred and seventy-three Arroves of Cochineal, five thousand four hundred and thirty-two Arroves of Indigo, and other valuable Effects: And on the 17th arrived at the same Port, the Havana Company's Ship the *Assumption*, from the Havana, with about one hundred and twenty thousand hard Dollars in Specie, twenty four thousand Arroves of Snuff and Tobacco, fourteen thousand Arroves of Sugar, and other Effects.

Brussels, March 5. The French Troops upon the Frontiers of the Austrian Dominions in the Low Countries, continue to remain very quiet; but Part of those that have been quarter'd this Winter in Lorrain and Alsace, are now marching towards the Coasts of the Ocean. According to our Advices Yesterday from Paris, the Comte de Lannion is already set out to take upon him, as Marchal de Camp, the command of the Troops that are assembling on the Coast of Provence.
