The KING's most Excellent Majesty

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 27th of January last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant February— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer: — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of March next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of March next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Constantinople, February 3.* The Vizir Che-  
aia was deposed on the 17th past, but immedi-  
ately named to the Paschalyck of Salonica,  
which gives him the Dignity of Three Tails.  
Hamza Efendi, the Reis Efendi, succeeded him,  
and the Cuchuk Tefcaragee or Second Secretary  
of the Vizir's Divan, is promoted to the Post of  
Reis Efendi. M. de Vergennes, who has resided  
here some Months as Envoy Extraordinary  
from the Court of France, has assum'd the  
Character of Ambassador, which he has notified  
to the Porte and Foreign Ministers, and is pre-  
paring to take his Audience of the Sultan as such  
on the 18th Instant; at which Time there will  
be a Pay of the Janizaries:

*Naples, Feb. 11.* The King having ordered  
a Regiment of Horse to be sent to Sicily, the  
Vessels on board of which they are embarked  
will sail for Palermo with the first fair Wind.  
Last Week Advice was received at Court that  
some Barbary Corsairs were cruising in the Seas  
of Sicily and Calabria, whereupon Orders were  
immediately issued for equipping several of our  
Chebecks, in order to give them Chace.

*Rome, Feb. 14.* We are informed by Let-  
ters from the Romagna, that Earthquakes have  
been very frequent of late in that Country, and  
that several Houses were lately thrown down  
by the Violence of a Shock at Sezza. 'Tis  
said the Promotion of Cardinals, in Favour of  
the Nomination of the crowned Heads, will be  
made some Time next Month.

*Lisbon, Feb. 22.* On the 19th Instant, his  
Britannick Majesty's Ships the Hampton Court  
and the Greyhound arrived here with several  
Merchantmen under their Convoy. There are  
now ten Ships with Provisions arrived from Lon-  
don, one from Dartmouth, and five from  
Ireland.

*Ratisbon, Feb. 25.* Last Thursday we had  
a most violent Storm of Wind in these Parts.  
It lasted about three Hours, during which it did  
an infinite deal of Damage to many Houses in  
this City and its Neighbourhood, by stripping  
off the Tiles, and throwing down the Chim-  
neys.

nies. The Gardens have likewise suffered greatly on this Occasion.

*Hamburg, March 2.* Prince George of Holstein, Major General in the King of Prussia's Service; having made some Stay here, and at Eutin with his Brother the Bishop of Lubeck, set out the Day before Yesterday on his Return to his Regiment, which is quartered at Riesen-berg near Dantzick; the Prince takes Berlin in his Way, where he purposes to pass a few Days.

*Brussels, March 9.* A Battalion of the Regiment of Rouergue set out on the 23d of February from Thionville for Normandy, and was replaced on the 28th by a Battalion of Militia. A Battalion of Royal Artillery marched on the 26th of the same Month from Metz, with several Waggon's loaded with Field Artillery and Military Stores, and after joining another Train of the same Sort which is coming from Strasbourg, is to continue its March towards Normandy: We learn also, that the Regiment d'Enghien took the same Route on the 29th, and is to be followed by the Regiments of Champagne and Normandie about the 25th Instant: We are moreover assured, that the Regiments of Clare and Berwick, which were in Garrison at St. Omer, received Orders on the 24th of last Month, to march directly towards Cherbourg, where they are to be embarked. The Duke of St. Albans, and several others of his Britannick Majesty's Subjects, are arrived here from France, in Consequence of the Orders issued by the French Court, for them to quit Paris by the 1st Instant, and the Kingdom by the 15th.

WHEREAS the King has been pleased, by His Order in Council, to direct the Embargo to be taken off from all Coasting Vessels (except Colliers) which go from Port to Port; and likewise from all Fishing Vessels, and other small Craft, which ply in the Rivers, Bays, or Creeks, of this Kingdom; and also from all Ships and Vessels bound to the Greenland Seas for Fishing; my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do hereby give Notice, that they have countermanded their late Orders, for pressing from Protections, so far as the same respect the Crews of any of the said Ships, Vessels, Smacks, or Craft; and that the Protections, which were granted for any of them before the late general Press, are to be valid, and continue in Force for the full Times specified in such Protections respectively: And as any other Ships or Vessels shall be cleared from the Embargo, the like Regard is to be had to their Protections, and no Men are to be pressed therefrom.
