AT the Court at St. James's the 28th Day of February 1756,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 27th of January last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant February— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer: — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of March next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of March next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Stockholm, Feb. 20. The States of this Kingdom are to assemble in a few Days, in order to chuse a new Governor to the Prince Royal, in the Room of Count Tessin, who lately resigned that Post.

Genoa, Feb. 21. The Waterland, a Dutch Man of War, commanded by Captain Vlak, arrived here last Monday, in order to convoy Home the Merchantmen belonging to that Nation.

Copenhagen, Feb. 23. Last Week the King filled up several Military Employments. This Day the Emanuel, belonging to the Asiatick Company of this City, arrived in our Road from China.

Turin, Feb. 28. Yesterday Her Royal Highness the Dutches of Savoy was so well recovered as to receive in the Morning the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, and in the Evening the rest of the Nobility. This Day being the Birth-Day of her Royal Highness Madame de Savoy, the same was observed at Court as usual.

Vienna, Feb. 28. In Conformity to a Resolution taken lately at Court, a great Number of Workmen are gone from hence to Buda and Peterwaradin, in order to repair the Fortifications of those two Places.

Berlin, March 6. The King has appointed Count Eichstedt to be Great Master of the Wardrobe, in the Room of the late Count Bredow.

Dresden, March 7. The Diversions of the Carnival have ceased since Wednesday last the 3d Instant, and on the 5th there was a great drawing Room at Court, on Account of his Polish Majesty's and the Electoral Prince's Name Day.

Hague, March 11. On Monday last the Prince Stadtholder's Birth-Day was celebrated at Court with great Magnificence; when her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and the young Prince and his Sister, received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, Lords of the Regency, and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes, on the Occasion; and at Night there was a grand Entertainment, and afterwards a Ball.

Whereas the King has been pleased, by His Order in Council, to direct the Embargo to be taken off from all Coasting Vessels (except Colliers) which go from Port to Port; and likewise from all Fishing Vessels, and other small Craft, which ply in the Rivers, Bays, or Creeks, of this Kingdom; and also from all Ships and Vessels bound to the Greenland Seas for Fishing; my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do hereby give Notice, that they have countermanded their late Orders, for pressing from Protections, so far as the same respect the Crews of any of the said Ships, Vessels, Smacks, or Craft; and that the Protections, which were granted for any of them before the late general Press, are to be valid, and continue in Force for the full Times specified in such Protections respectively: And as any other Ships or Vessels shall be cleared from the Embargo, the like Regard is to be had to their Protections, and no Men are to be pressed therefrom.
