AT the Court at St. James's the 28th Day of February 1756,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 27th of January 1756, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant February— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer: — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of March next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of March next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, with Hearts filled with grateful Sentiments of your Majesty's paternal Care for the Welfare of these Kingdoms, do humbly beg leave to express the deep Sense we have of your Royal Wisdom, in the vigorous Measures you have so steadily pursued, in asserting your undoubted Right to your American Dominions, in the prudent and interesting Treaties you have so successfully concluded, and in the happy Effects of your great Humanity and Royal Bounty to the unfortunate Sufferers at Lisbon; these, with the many other Instances of your Majesty's Wisdom and Benevolence, all concur to add fresh Glories to your Majesty's Reign, to endear your Person and Government to the Heart of every Britain, and to defeat the insolent and unjust Usurpations of an ambitious and perfidious Power, envious of your Greatness and our Happiness.

And if an Invasion, or any other Emergency during the present critical Conjunction, should require your Majesty's loyal Subjects to appear in the Defence of your sacred Person, or the Security of the Protestant Succession in your illustrious House; we hope our Actions shall then declare how sensible we are of the Benefits derived to us, from the Wisdom and Equity of your Majesty's Government; in Support of which, we with true Zeal humbly offer to form ourselves into a Troop of Light Horse compleat.

compleat; and will be ready to march at your Majesty's Command, and at our own Expence, to any Part of Great Britain, under the Discipline and Command of such experienced Officers as your Majesty may be pleased to send us for that Purpose. And most gracious Sovereign, if this Method of shewing our sincere Attachment to your Majesty and illustrious Family, should not meet your Majesty's Royal Approbation, we are ready to dispose of our Persons and Fortunes, in such other Manner as your Majesty in your great Wisdom may think most expedient.

And as the Prosperity and Safety of this Nation entirely depend (under God) on the Continuance of our present Happiness from the Influence of your Majesty's Wisdom and Justice, we therefore offer up our most ardent Prayers to the great and supreme Disposer of all Things, for the Health and Preservation of your Royal Person; and that your Endeavours for the publick Welfare may be attended with Success and crowned with Honour, so that the present Crises may hereafter appear among the shining Periods of the British History.
