AT the Court at St. James's the 28th Day of February 1756,

PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

7.7 Hereas the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 27th of Ja-1.1. for pe ing the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who had voluntarily enter themselves in Hi. March's Payal Navy; And likewife for paying the Rewards to Perfons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant February— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer: — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereb Order, that the Bounties of Three Pourses for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of March next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Abie, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the faid 318 Day of March next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, fo as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern them-felves accordingly. W. Sharpe.
