The KING's most Excellent Majesty  
in Council,

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 27th of January last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant February— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer: — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of March next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of March next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Naples, Feb. 27.* On Friday and Saturday last several slight Shocks of an Earthquake were felt in this City, but they happily went off without doing any considerable Damage. A fine new Galley was launched here a few Days ago, which was built by the King's Order, in the Room of the Galley that was seized and carried off to the Coast of Barbary in August last, by the Slaves who were on board her.

*Turin, March 2.* We hear that a Camp will be formed this Summer in the Neighbourhood of this City; and 'tis said that the General Officers, who are to have the chief Command thereof, are already named.

*Rome, March 6.* We have received an Account, that the Pope's Frigate the St. Paul put to Sea last Week from Civitta Vecchia on a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates, who have of late greatly interrupted the Navigation of these Seas.

*Stockholm, March 9.* The King has confirmed the Senate's Choice of Baron de Scheffer to be Governor to the Prince Royal. We are assured, that Orders are sent to Carlscroon, to equip six Frigats, which are to cruize this Summer in the Baltick. The Weather is set in so mild in this Country, that the Rivers and Lakes are already free from Ice.

*Dantzick, March 10.* Within these few Days past, a great Quantity of Timber, for building Houses, &c. has been shipped off from this

this Port for Lisbon. According to our last Advices from Nimerow, the Contagious Distemper, which ceased for some Time in the Neighbourhood of that City, is broke out again; and that the greatest Precautions are already taken to prevent its spreading. The Small Pox continues to make great Havock in this City.

*Copenhagen, March 13.* On Saturday last the King went to see the Squadron that is equipping in this Port; after which his Majesty went to the Dock-Yards, and viewed the Ships on the Stocks. The King has appointed Wednesday the 21st of next Month to be observed as a Day of Fasting and Humiliation throughout this Kingdom. Last Wednesday one Lazare, a Jew about thirty Years of Age, was publickly baptized in the Chapel at the Palace, and named Frederick Jules, the King and Queen, the Queen-Mother, and the Princess Charlotte, standing Godfather and Godmothers. Great Numbers of the Nobility and Gentry, of both Sexes, were present on this Occasion.

*Brussels, March 18.* On Saturday last, being the Birth-Day of the Archduke Joseph, who then entred into the 16th Year of his Age, Prince Charles of Lorraine, our Governor General, received the Compliments of the Nobility and Gentry on that Occasion. Several Persons belonging to the English Nation are arrived here on their Return from France to their own Country. According to our last Advices from Metz, a large Train of Artillery, as Cannon, Mortars, Bombs, &c. are marched from thence for the Coast of Normandy. Our Letters from Strasbourg likewise take Notice, that a large Train of Warlike Stores was also expected to set out from thence in a few Days for Normandy.

*Hambourgh, March 19.* Count de Rosenbergh, the Emperor's Envoy at the Court of Denmark, having received his Recal, arrived here Yesterday Morning from Copenhagen; and, in the Afternoon, continued on his Journey to Vienna.

*Hague, March 23.* The States of Holland and Westfrizeland have this Day re-assumed their Deliberations. Yesterday Morning the Prince Stadtholder went to view the Foundry established here; and having examined into the Nature of those Works, with which he seemed highly entertained, his Highness ordered a handsome Present to be given to the Workmen.

*Publick Notice is hereby given, that these several additional Conveyances, Improvements, and Regulations, will take Place from Friday the 10th Day of October next, being Michaelmas Day according to the Old Style.*
