WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 28th of February last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 31st Day of this Instant March.— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer:— It is thereupon this Day Ordered in Council, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 30th Day of April next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said 30th Day of April next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS His Majesty hath received Information from His Consul at Algiers, that the Plague has lately broke out there; and that as it was increasing, the said Consul, together with the Consuls of other Nations, and the Merchants, had been obliged to shut themselves up within their Houses.— And whereas a Quarantine of Forty Days was (by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 1st of March, 1754.) laid upon all Ships, Vessels, Merchandize, &c. coming from Algiers, and all other Parts of Barbary, into any Port of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man:— Which Quarantine is subsisting at this Time— His Majesty in Council is therefore hereby pleased to notify the same, that all Persons whom it may concern, may be duly apprized thereof— And His Majesty conceives it proper upon the present Occasion, to order, require and command, that all the Rules, Regulations and Directions, laid down in the aforesaid Order of Council for the better Performance of the said Quarantine, be punctually and strictly complied with— And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Permit us therefore humbly to assure your Majesty, that we will most heartily and zealously exert ourselves, in every Instance, for the Support of the publick Credit of this Kingdom, and that no Hazard or Expence shall deter us from cheerfully contributing to enable your Majesty to maintain the just Cause in which you are engaged, and to repel the most daring Attempts of your Enemies, in such Manner as your Majesty shall judge necessary for supporting the Honour and Dignity of your Crown, and the Welfare and Happiness of a free and grateful People.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return this most Gracious Answer.

I Thank you for this affectionate, and seasonable Address. It is a great Satisfaction to Me, that the Measures, which I have taken, for

the Security of the Rights, and Possessions, of My Crown, and for the Support of the Trade, and Commerce, of My Kingdoms, are so agreeable to My Trading Subjects; and they may always depend upon My Countenance, and Protection. The Publick Credit is an Object, which I have extremely at Heart; and nothing can be more acceptable to Me, than the Zeal, you express, for the Support of it.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Sheriff and Grand Jury for the County of York, having observ'd by your Majesty's most gracious Message to both Houses of Parliament, a settled Design form'd by our most inveterate and dangerous Enemy the French King, for an Invasion either of your Majesty's Dominions of Great Britain or Ireland, think ourselves bound by all the Obligations of Duty and Affection to your Majesty's sacred Person and most equitable Government, to express our grateful and just Sense of your Majesty's great Goodness, Wisdom and Prudence, in taking every necessary Precaution to frustrate so unjust and so unprovok'd an Attempt. When we consider how much your Majesty reigns in the Hearts of your People, and the many glorious Actions of our Ancestors in the Defence of the Liberty we now most uninterruptedly enjoy, we cannot look upon such a daring Attempt without the greatest Indignation.

But as the Injustice, as well as Insolence of our Enemy is circumscrib'd by no Bounds, and at the same Time attended and supported by great Military Force, we cannot omit assuring your Majesty of our Readiness and Desire of engaging in the Defence of your Royal Person, Family and Government, with our Lives and Fortunes; and that if it shall be thought proper to put Arms into the Hands of your Subjects, we will be the Foremost to use them in the Chastisement of your Enemies; establishing the Glory of your Majesty's Reign, and the Peace and Happiness of your Subjects and Kingdoms.

May your Majesty's Reign over these Kingdoms be long and happy, and may our latest Posterity, a free and grateful People like ourselves, for ever enjoy, under Princes of your Majesty's Royal Blood, those invaluable Blessings which your Majesty's glorious, just and moderate Reign, has so remarkably and paternally diffus'd amongst all your People.

Naples, March 10. Six of our Chebecks put to Sea last Week on a Cruize against the Barbary Corsairs, who have lately very much infested the Coasts of this Kingdom, and greatly interrupted our Commerce.

Rome, March 13. 'Tis now said that the Promotion of Cardinals, in Favour of the Recommendations

Recommendations of the crowned Heads, will not take Place till after Easter. The Pope has sent Orders to the Commandant of Civitta Vecchia, to release the Captain of an Algerine Pink that was taken about three Months ago by one of our Frigates named the St. Paul, the said Captain having paid one hundred Sequins for his and his Father's Ransom.

Copenhagen, March 26. We are informed that the Reviews of the Troops of this Kingdom will be made early in the Spring, after which the King will set out for Holstein, in order to review the Body of Troops that are to encamp in the Neighbourhood of Rendsbourg, which is to consist of five Regiments of Foot, and four of Horse.

Vienna, March 27. The Prince de Sulkowski, the Landgrave of Furstenberg, and Count Sinzendorff, were sworn, on Sunday last, of their Imperial Majesties Privy Council. Baron Feckenbach, the Prince Bishop of Wurtzbourg's Minister to the Diet of the Empire, who arrived here a few Days ago from Ratibon, is shortly to receive, from the Hands of the Emperor, the Investiture of the Temporalities of the Prince Bishop his Master. Count Khevenhuller, and Count Dietrichstein, are on their Departure, the one for the Court of Portugal, and the other for that of Denmark, where they are to reside as their Imperial Majesties Ministers.

Berlin, March 30. On Saturday last, being the Anniversary of the Queen Mother's Birth-Day, who then entred into the 70th Year of her Age, the same was celebrated at Court with great Splendour, and at Night a new Opera, called Merope, was performed at the Theatre in the Castle. The King came here last Thursday from Potzdam, in order to be present on the Occasion, and did not return thither again till Yesterday. During his Majesty's Stay here, he reviewed the Regiments of this Garrison, which were drawn out for that Purpose. The Marquess de Vallory, the new Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from France to this Court, has had his first Audiences of the King and two Queens; and the Chevalier de la Touche, whom he succeeds, will set out next Thursday on his Return to Paris.

Brussels, April 6. The Prince of Soubise, Lieutenant General St. Germain, and several other Officers of Rank, arrived at Dunkirk last Friday the 2d Instant. Marshal de Belle Isle was still at Paris, according to our last Advices from thence; but all the other General Officers, appointed to command upon the Coasts of the Ocean, sat out last Week for their respective Posts.

Hague, April 6. The Assembly of the States of Holland and Westfrizeland is adjourned to Wednesday the 14th Instant. The Prince of

Nassau-Weilbourg, who has been here best Part of the Winter, is gone from hence for England. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has lately disposed of several subaltern Military Employments.
