May Divine Providence guard and prolong your important Life; give Succefs to your Councils and Arms againft all Oppofition; and may the Enjoyment of our civil and religious Liberties, under the Protection of your Majefty and your illustrious House, be conveyed to the lateft Pofferity.

 \mathbf{W}^{E} your Majefty's moft dutiful and loval Subjects, the Sheriff and Grand Jury for the County of York, having observ'd by your Majesty's most gracious Message to both Houses of Parliament, a settled Design form'd by our most inveterate and dangerous Enemy the French King, for an Invafion either of your Majefty's Dominions of Great Britain or Ireland, think ourfelves bound by all the Obligations of Duty and Affection to your Majesty's facred Person and most equitable Government, to express our grateful and just Sense of your Majesty's great Goodnefs, Wildom and Prudence, in taking every neceffary Precaution to frustrate fo unjust and fo unprovok'd an Attempt. When we confider how much your Majefty reigns in the Hearts of your People, and the many glorious Actions of our Ancestors in the Defence of the Liberty we now most uninterruptedly enjoy, we cannot look upon fuch a daring Attempt without the greateft Indignation.
