WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen, Capital Burgesses, and Common Council of the Town of Lancaster, most humbly implore your Majesty's Pardon for taking off your Royal Attention at this Time from Affairs of the highest Importance, when your Majesty's Kingdoms are threatned with an Invasion by the avow'd Enemies of the Liberties of Mankind, as well as your Majesty.

But being greatly alarm'd for the Safety of your Majesty's Person, and fired with Indignation at the Insults offer'd to your Majesty for exerting that Power God has put into your Hands in maintaining the settled and acknowledged Rights of Great Britain in America, we cannot resist the earnest Desire we have, at this critical Conjuncture, of assuring your Majesty, in the most solemn Manner, of our inviolable Attachment and Fidelity to your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, and our determined Resolution to support and defend both at the Hazard of all that is dear to us.

Conscious of the invaluable Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's auspicious Reign, we pray to Heaven for a long Continuance of that Life on which so much depends; and possessing in the happiest Degree our Civil and Religious Liberties, we rest secure they will be convey'd down to latest Posterity under the Instuence of Princes of your illustrious Family, governing according to those Maxims which have so justly acquired your Majesty the Hearts of your People.

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The following Address of the Magistrates and Council of the City of Edinburgh has been presented to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

WE the Magistrates and Council of the City of Edinburgh, humbly beg Leave to join with all your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, in testifying our Abhorrence of the Intentions of the Court of France, to make an Invasion upon Great Britain or Ireland, an Enterprise formed in Despair and Rage, on Account of your Majesty's having resented the Encroachments, Depredations and Murders committed by the French in North America.

It is now above Forty Years fince their Monarchy was preserved by the Indulgence shew'd them in the Reign of her late Majesty Queen

Anne; the Treaty of Utrecht, which then fav'd them from Ruin, has been ever fince their constant Object for the Violation of publick Faith.

They lately formed a Scheme to invade your Majesty's Foreign Dominions, merely on Account of your Royal Protection of the Rights of Great Britain, which your Majesty's wise and prudent Measures has rendered Abortive; and we cannot now omit expressing our great Satisfaction, in the immediate Assistance we shall have from those very Territories, which the common Enemy had mark'd out for Destruction: This we owe to your Majesty's gracious Compliance with the Desires of the two Houses of Parliament.

May the Almighty long preserve your Sacred Majesty, the Protector of your Subjects, and Desender of the Rights of Great Britain; and may your Subjects, with Gratitude, be ever sensible of the Happiness they have enjoy'd, and cannot fail to be bless'd with, during your Majesty's Reign.
